**FOR SUMMER WEAR**

Silk Frocks Are Likely to Rival Costumes of Cotton.

Cape Dresses Are Found to Be Practical, Attractive and Suitable for Many Uses.

Taffetas, canton crepes and georgettes are now the most interesting items occupying the interest of the dress and costume trade. Costumes assume greater importance each hour, especially in the frock and jacket or frock and cape, which are adroitly varied by frock and sleeveless box or mandarin jacket combinations. Both women and misses exhibit marked interest in these adaptations.

Some manufacturers are showing crepe in a number of frocks that are decidedly straight in lines. One frock has a cerise ribbon running through the pockets, around the square neck and down the front. Another smart crepe frock is shown in white and finished off in black, with trimming of black buttons.

The crepe costume is shown in solid colors as well as mixed, one model being in orange, having a green silk thread making a check. The green is repeated in the bindings of the neck and sleeves.

There is no denial that the three-piece frock is selling extremely well, and there is also a strong demand for smart taffeta dresses. One model had its coat designed in long-waisted lines, gridded attractively and trimmed with a circular ruffle. Coat buttons run up to the neck and a smart crisp collar adorns the coat itself. The girdle is

of blue leather studded with steel beads, with green taffeta for trimmings.

Some buyers express the belief that there will be a great vogue this summer for the silk dress built on simple lines, rather than for the cotton frock. Heavier types are thought to be the materials most likely to be favored. Roshanara and heavy cantons especially are believed best adapted to the straight lines and conservative styles of the times.

Fancy and Color Combinations Extend to Cotton Frocks for Porch and Morning Wear.

The fancy and color combinations so much in evidence this spring extend to simple cotton frocks for porch and morning wear.

The lavender shades, green, blue, including periwinkle, which have had so much publicity, and the vivid dandelion yellow which is now occupying a prominent place in the style procession, are all featured in gingham, with rather small checks preferred. White and one of the colors are usually combined in a small check. Of course, the vivid Scotch plaid ghinghams are still used, especially for children, but the preference is for two-tone effects in the small patterns.

Linen is to be worn more this season than for several years, due primarily to the fact that it is more reasonable in price, but an all-linen frock does require a great deal of pressing and laundering to keep it in presentable condition, as all linens rumple very easily. When combined with gingham a more practical frock is the result.

One smart little gingham frock seen recently, in a yellow and white check, was trimmed with latticed insertions formed of white organdie set lengthwise of the skirt so as to give it a panel effect, the waist being similarly treated. A row of the insertion trimmed each outer sleeve and the neck was finished with an organdie frill.

**LONG GLOVES SUMMER STYLE**

The sleeves on summer frocks are either going to be very short, just a mere suggestion of sleeves or so long and wide and sheer that they demand the very long gloves anyway.

With maids and matrons of every age becoming more and more enamored of the all-white costume as the season progresses, the long white silk glove will enjoy an unprecedented popularity and will doubtless achieve a state of elaboration and originality of design never heretofore known.

There is a novelty glove that thoughtfully considers the woman with the thin arms. The 16-button silk glove is overlaid with two silk puffings run with elastic. The elastic holds the glove up on the arm and the puffings give a desirable fullness.

The bracelet glove is another 16-button novelty which has two embroidered bands in contrasting colors at the wrist.

An extraordinary touch which may perhaps set a new fashion for wedding gowns is seen on a bridal robe. The dress itself is conventional white satin, with an unusually long veil trailing for many yards and sharply squared at the ends, which are weighed with clusters of orange blossoms. The extraordinary touch is the introduction of a bit of color. Long, loose-like panels sweep down from the shoulder and these are faced with the faintest green. The gown thus repeats the white and green of the bridal bouquet at its side, and the gleam of color is fascinating.

**NEGLIGEE RULES IN LONDON**

Wearables Carried to the Highest Degree of Art, Characteristic of Spring Modes.

Negligee carried to the highest degree of art is the dominant characteristic of the London spring fashions.

The waist line has slipped down to the middle of the hips and is marked only by a loose girdle, generally of bright colored beads, which contrast agreeably with the simple hues of the frocks themselves.

In all dresses, whether for morning, afternoon or evening wear, there is an under robe over which flowing draperies are arranged.

Sleeves are full and fantastic. They droop from the arm, with little vignettes cut out from the shoulder, and tighten to the cuff round the wrist.

Skirts are gradually lengthening, and while décolletage remains low at the back, it is gradually rising to front.

**Old Tablecloths.**

**STRENGTH IS SHOWN IN COTTON MARKET**

Buying on Condition Report Tends to Send Up Active Months.

New Orleans, La.—Although something of a reactionary tendency was shown by the cotton market in the early sessions of the week just ended, the later sessions brought pressure to buy and strong advances were under way for some time. Much of the buying was done on bullish anticipations regarding the first condition report of the season from the government.

Highest prices came on the closing session, when July touched 20.89c and the list of active months was 55 to 96 points higher than the close of the preceding week. Last prices were at net gains of 71 to 83 points, with July at 20.76c.

July was at all times the strongest month. According to the weekly statement the visible supply of American cotton is now down to 2,943,184 bales, against 4,280,495 a year ago. Stocks at the thirty counted interior towns have been reduced to 634,717 bales, against 1,271,196 a year ago, and stocks at all ports amount to only 896,277 bales, against 1,582,196 a year ago.

While weather conditions over the belt were regarded as showing some improvement, they still were looked upon as being far from satisfactory and crop reports were a constant support to the market. Private bureau estimates of condition that attracted most attention ranged from 65 to 67 per cent of normal, although there were reports of 68 and 69 per cent, and one as high as 71.8 per cent, conditions point to a crop of 10,243,000 bales, according to the government formula.

**SHREVEPORT TERRITORY SHOWS PRODUCTION LOSS**

Shreveport, La.—Declines all along the line in number of producers, initial production and daily average production were recorded in the Shreveport territory, including El Dorado, Ark., during the past week. The daily average production, with decreases in Hayneville and Homer and small increases in all the other districts, amounted to 121,285 barrels, a decrease of 3,414 barrels for the week. The week's field record showed 47 completions, including two gasers, nine failures and 36 producers with combined initial yield of 8,718 barrels, compared with the preceding week's record of 51 completions, including eight failures and 43 producing wells with combined initial production of 12,099 barrels. There was a decline of 11 in number of completions, a decline of seven in number of producers and a decline of 3,381 barrels in initial production.

The principal cause mentioned for the falling off in field results is the weather, which was unusually unfavorable during the last week. Twice there were severe windstorms with heavy downpour of rain, resulting in scores of derricks being felled and other damage entailed and also causing some of the drilling activities to be temporarily suspended. The Hayneville field suffered especially heavy losses in the blowing down of derricks.

Gibland, La.—With a membership of seventeen, the graduation class of the Gibland high school was the largest in its history. Diplomas were presented by Parish Superintendent Fisher of Arcadia. The class history was given by Joseph Cox, class prophecy by Miss Gertrude Humphrey, and class address by Roy Callahan. The other graduates were: Margaret Parnell, Lena Sherman, Hazel Hart, Erma McNeil, Agnes Henry, Beady Sutton, Lorraine Johnson, Pauline Cathey, Edna Mobley, Pearl Reno, Esta Reese, Paxton Callahan, Lee Ousts, Harold Rogers.

**Trail Survey Progresses.**

Sildell, La.—Considering the heavy undergrowth and swamp through which the route passes, rapid work was made during the past week by State Highway Engineers Nicholson and Monget in surveying the route of the Old Spanish Trail through Honey Island between Pearl River station and the Mississippi state line.

**Tick Eradication Predicted.**

Shreveport, La.—Due to the complete co-operation of the Texas and Arkansas counties bordering on the Caddo line, the eradication of the Texas fever tick before the end of the present dipping season is practically assured, according to Hal M. Gatti, parish inspector of tick eradication work.

**School at Estherwood Ends.**

Estherwood, La.—The Estherwood school completed a successful season with a program of plays and music before a large audience at the big brick school building. The teachers were given an ovation for their fine work during the year.

**Ruston Wages Rat War.**

Ruston, La.—The Ruston Retail Merchants' Association has started a city-wide war on rats. May 29 to June 3 will be rat week in Ruston.
