On May 30th, 1913, a mass meeting of the women of Morgan City was held in the City Hall to organize a Civic League. This meeting was addressed by Miss Agnes Morris (of the State Board of Health) who inspired the women to such an extent that the success of the movement was assured from the first start. The work of the League was to be entirely civic and was pledged not to enter into questions of religion, politics, or woman's suffrage. Since 1913 a wonderful work has been accomplished due to the personal efforts of the members and the untiring devotion and able leadership of the president, Mrs. Albert Storm.

Mayor Shannon and the officials of Morgan City have cheerfully cooperated with the women and have helped materially on all occasions. The work of these years has included two to three "town clean-ups" a year. The garbage is being taken care of in a more sanitary manner, the park is wonderfully improved, and one can hardly fail to give credit to the Civic League for the many small as well as large improvements that one feels and sees every day. During the past year the Civic League has had two clean up campaigns, one alone costing \$92.25.

Owing to the generosity of Mrs. Jos. Dyer, Mr. Natili's daughter, the "Natili Memorial" fountain in the park has been presented to the town through the Civic League.

The selling of Red Cross stamps has given the privilege of the Anti-tuberculous Camp to Morgan City.

Arbor Day was celebrated with the cooperation of ten organizations, and \$20 worth of plants and palms were ordered and planted.

"Better Baby Week" was observed and fifty babies were examined through the courtesy of Dr. Butterwith (New Orleans) who sent his assistant, Dr. Kimberger, to give us two days of his valuable time. The parents (Continued on page 3)

STORM NEARING THE GULF COAST SECTION

According to Weather Bureau Signals, which were received by Displayman Jolley this morning the storm is nearing the Texas and Louisiana Coast. The advisory this morning read: "Advisory northeast storm warning ordered Texas Coast 7:40 A. M. Tropical disturbance probably moving north of west in west gulf increasing winds with northeast gales and high tides on Texas Coast today and to-

night. Vessels bound from New Orleans to Cuban and Central American ports may proceed."

Federal Inquiry or Railroad Strike?

Faced by demands from the conductors, engineers, firemen and brakemen that would impose on the country an additional burden in transportation costs of \$100,000,000 a year, the railroads propose that this wage problem be settled by reference to an impartial Federal tribunal.

With these employes, whose efficient service is acknowledged, the railroads have no differences that could not be considered fairly and decided justly by such a public body.

Railroads Urge Public Inquiry and Arbitration

The formal proposal of the railroads to the employes for the settlement of the controversy is as follows:

- "Our conferences have demonstrated that we cannot harmonize our differences of opinion and that eventually the matters in controversy must be passed upon by other and disinterested agencies. Therefore, we propose that your proposals and the proposition of the railroads be disposed of by one or the other of the following methods:
1. Preferably by submission to the Interstate Commerce Commission, the only tribunal which, by reason of its accumulated information bearing on railway conditions and its control of the revenue of the railways, is in a position to consider and protect the rights and equities of all the interests affected, and to provide additional revenue necessary to meet the added cost of operation in case your proposals are found by the Commission to be just and reasonable; or, in the event the Interstate Commerce Commission cannot, under existing laws, act in the premises, that we jointly request Congress to take such action as may be necessary to enable the Commission to consider and promptly dispose of the questions involved; or
 2. By arbitration in accordance with the provisions of the Federal law" (The Newlands Act).

Leaders Refuse Offer and Take Strike Vote

Leaders of the train service brotherhoods, at the joint conference held in New York, June 1-15, refused the offer of the railroads to submit the issue to arbitration or Federal review, and the employes are now voting on the question whether authority shall be given these leaders to declare a nation-wide strike.

The Interstate Commerce Commission is proposed by the railroads as the public body to which this issue ought to be referred for these reasons:

- No other body with such an intimate knowledge of railroad conditions has such an unquestioned position in the public confidence.
- The rates the railroads may charge the public for transportation are now largely fixed by this Government board.
- Out of every dollar received by the railroads from the public nearly one-half is paid directly to the employes as wages, and the money to pay increased wages can come from no other source than the rates paid by the public.
- The Interstate Commerce Commission, with its control over rates, is in a position to make a complete investigation and render such decision as will protect the interests of the railroad employes, the owners of the railroads, and the public.

A Question For the Public to Decide

The railroads feel that they have no right to grant a wage preferment of \$100,000,000 a year to these employes, now highly paid and constituting only one-fifth of all the employes, without a clear mandate from a public tribunal that shall determine the merits of the case after a review of all the facts.

The single issue before the country is whether this controversy is to be settled by an impartial Government inquiry or by industrial warfare.
