Minutes of the Farmer's Meeting at Centerville.

August 12, 1916.  
Meeting was called to order in the Domestic Science Building of the public school by President Oscar Boudreaux.  
Roll call showed fifteen members present.  
The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.  
Mr. Boudreaux exhibited some Soya Bean plants from his farm in which considerable interest was shown. In the discussion it was proven that this plant produced more cow peas are now doing for our lands, besides a large yield of dry beans with a high cash value. The only difficulty appeared to be getting a stand, and this seemed to have been overcome by some farmers by planting very shallow.

Selection of seed corn was then discussed, and Mr. M. L. Wilson, Agricultural Agent for the Parish of Caddo, being present, was invited to address the club. This he did in a very pleasing and instructive manner, telling of the experiments over several years at the experimental station at Baton Rouge, and the results he and various farmers had obtained in experiments in the northern part of the state. His special study of the subject and the results of experiments prompted him to advise against the attempt to raise seed corn in place, but to make seed selection in the field, from the whole crop. When harvesting, by the use of boxes or bags, to put aside a large quantity of corn from which later to select seed. He advised: Select from a medium sized stalk having one to two well formed ears four to five feet from the ground, and strong bench roots. Hanging ears, well covered to the end, of medium size, say 8 to 10 inches long. Corn thus selected should be put in store separate from the other corn, and when selecting seed from this, take such ears as had best resisted the weevil, having tight shuck, full deep grain so shaped as to make a solid layer of corn on the cob, with space between the rows of grain at the cob. This method he said his experience showed, would give a farmer an excellent quality of corn in the course of three years, no matter what variety he chose.

Mr. Wilson touched upon many points of interest to farmers, and in conclusion said that he had never seen such cooperation as he found in this community, and that he was studying it with the view of assisting other localities to do likewise.  
A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Wilson for his very able talk.  
On motion duly carried, a meeting of the club was called for one o'clock p. m. Friday 18, for the purpose of going in a body to the experimental farm in Iberia Parish, and a committee of five was appointed to provide conveyances for the members at the expense of the club. The chair appointed the following members on the committee: W. J. Young, J. C. Clausen, F. N. West, A. H. Babin, and O. Boudreaux.

Woman's Missionary Society

Of the M. E. Church, South, Study Conditions in Foreign Countries.

The Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church South, was known a few years ago as the "Woman's Home Mission Society". Last December the auxiliary in Morgan City joined the ranks under the new name. There are several who have remained in the organization, however, as local members, and whose efforts are entirely directed toward home work. This loyalty to the society is very much appreciated, since they are not all Methodists.

The chief purpose of these women is to study by means of a reading course, and otherwise, the conditions in the foreign countries, especially China, India, Japan and Korea. Already there is evidence, both spiritual and material, of the enthusiasm toward helping the wretched people in these countries.

Another aim of the society is to assist financially the institutions in the south which are doing missionary work.

The local branch attends to the material needs of the parsonage, also helps in the distributing of the Christmas baskets to the old and lonely, assists the domestic science department of the high school, and gives occasionally to the destitute, especially children who need cloth-

ing in order to attend day school and Sunday School.

For several years the society has entirely clothed a little girl who was sent to the Ruston Orphanage from Morgan City.

On "Mother's Day", the women of this organization take charge of the services in the Methodist Church and distribute flowers as reminders of "mothers".

There is also a junior society under the leadership of the 1st vice-president of the adult society.

Flashes From Near and Far

Anglo-French arms advanced toward Combes in the center of the German positions the French making gains in Maurepas and Fleury and the British near Guilleumont in a drive extending along the whole front Pozieres to the Somme.

It was reported that Russian troops had crossed into Hungarian territory and were three miles across the border.

Official announcement was made that troops were fighting the Russians in the Carpathians.

The Manchester (Eng.) Guardian printed a strong editorial warning British leaders that America is becoming suspicious of the policies now favored by the ministry of Great Britain.

President Wilson's scheme to settle the railroad dispute was opposed by the managers at the White House and a firm stand made for arbitration, although a counter proposal is expected when they meet today.

The Senate passed the shipping bill carrying \$50,000,000 by a party vote of 38 to 21, and rejected the amendment to attach immigration bill as rider. The Senate foreign relations committee heard Secretary Lansing on the proposed purchase of Danish West Indies.

Representative Hay reintroduced the army appropriations bill in the House without the section which caused the President's veto and without the revised articles of war he approved.

The House accepted the child labor bill perfected in the Senate without debate on a record vote.

Dramatic scenes were enacted in the trial Jack Clark at Meridian, Miss., for killing Luthro Sharp.

The West Indian hurricane struck the Texas coast near Corpus Christi, doing much damage with the wind at 70 miles an hour. Wires went down before the full force of the storm was to be expected.
