**PRINT PAPER CRISIS IS DUE LATE IN OCTOBER**

Washington.—The crisis in the news-print paper situation, which already has cut down newspaper profits enormously, will not be reached till late in October, when contracts come up for renewal, according to reports received from many sources by the federal trade commission. The presidential election, together with the European war, is expected to increase an already unparalleled demand for news-print, which manufacturers tell the trade commission they will hardly be able to meet.

The trade commission's report on its investigation of news print prices, it was announced, would be published not later than October 1.

The great question in deciding whether there has been collusion among the manufacturers to boost prices unduly is said to be whether the increased demand for paper has been entirely disproportionate to the increased production. Manufacturers claim that publishers are using 20 per cent more paper than ever before.

None of the substitutes for pulp recently suggested is commercially feasible, according to officials of the various bureaus interested. Cotton stalks most frequently mentioned, would be prohibitively expensive to collect, they say.

**POSTAL DOTS.**

Some interesting historical data touching the introduction or beginning of the chief features of postal progress other than that already given may be briefly summarized as follows:

- Stamped Envelopes first issued ..... June, 1853.
- Letters Registered July, 1855.
- Newspaper Wrappers, Act of Congress ..... Feb., 1861.
- Free City Delivery July, 1863.
- Money Order System..... Nov., 1864.
- International Money Orders, 1881.
- Postal Cards ..... May, 1873.
- Postage Reduced to 2c..... Oct., 1883.
- Special Delivery ..Oct., 1885.
- Rural Delivery ... Oct., 1896.
- Postal Savings ..Jan., 1911.
- Parcel Post .....Jan., 1913.

The number of post offices in 1789 was 75. The maximum number reached 76,945, in 1901, since which time, by the introduction of rural delivery, the number has steadily declined, 20,565 having been discontinued. July 1, 1915, there were 56,380 post offices in operation.

Extent of post routes in miles in 1790 was 1,875. In 1915 the number was 433,334. The miles of service performed in 1915 amounted to 617,527,795.

The entire compensation paid to postmasters in 1789 was \$1,257. In 1915 the amount so paid was 399,143, 127.

Salary of Rural Delivery carriers has been increased from \$300 per annum in 1897 to \$1,200, the present rate. Present cost of Rural Delivery service per annum, \$52,000,000.

Reports from every section of St. Landry show a heavy decline in the prospects for a big yield of cotton this season, which prospect the farmers had a month or more ago.

The German fleet ventured out yesterday for the first time since the great battle off the Jutland, but returned to port on learning by its scouts that British forces were in considerable strength.

In a carefully laid trap, the British on the Somme front on last Friday, took 2,000 Teutons prisoners from the Leipzig redoubt. The men were marched out of their comfortable dug-out like gamblers caught in a police raid.

Governor E. T. Dunne of Illinois, arrived in New Orleans yesterday from the border where he went to investigate reports that militiamen were not being properly cared for. The governor said that all such rumors were groundless.

A receivership may be President Wilson's next move in the strike crisis, he serves warning he will not yield stand taken on 8 hour day, the Nation is to control the roads unless the railroad heads surrender, it is believed that Federal ownership may be the final relust of the controversy.
