THE MENACE ACUTE

Executive Sneer at the President's Faith

Angered at the De- May Act at Once and Declare the Strike On.

Washington, Aug. 25.—The menace is at its most acute.

President Wilson informed the executives today he will not guarantee at this session of Congress the legislation in return for conceding an eight hour day.

The railway executives are making their charge that a political game is being played from the White House with the hope that success will have a beneficial effect at the November election. A well equipped press corps has been established and a steady stream of "copy" intended to influence public opinion against the President's demands is being issued.

Statements that were obtained from the "big fellows" a few days ago, are now to be had by score and without the asking. Howard Elliott, of the New Orleans road and formerly of Howard University, turned loose guns on his old friend President Wilson. He said in part: "The eight hour question could only be solved after being carefully considered by a free press free from prejudice and favoritism."

President Ashton of the Northwestern, said: "The demand is unfair, as the operations of the railroads' operations have increased much faster in proportion, than the revenue traffic."

He was then confronted with this proposal: That the compensation the men shall receive under an eight hour day will be arbitrated, or, That the President guarantee he will approve an increase in freight rates to offset the increased cost of operation.

The President is declared to have repeated his original promise to use his personal and political influence, but stopped at that. When the committee left the White House both sides were deadlocked.

The delay angered the brotherhood leaders. They started to pack up and go home. The move was constructed as a silent threat to call a strike at once. This information reached the White House and President sent a messenger hurriedly to the camp of the leaders with the request that they remain at least another day.
