Echoes From The Past

History of the Local Catholic Church Prepared for The Review by Rev. Father Soubry

(Continued from August 23.)

The financial half of 1905 was devoted to paying part of principal and interest on the debt which was beginning to be felt. Messrs. John Dalton Sr., C. L. Wise, J. F. Prohaska, Thos. Shannon, A. A. Bourgeois, P. S. Winchester, Wm. Costello, John W. Gillen and others, contributed liberally in cancelling a \$500 note, due the First National Bank of Paterson. The late Mrs. C. R. Brownell, unsolicited, donated the bill for front doors and all openings amounting to \$95.00, and offered to help in securing the beautiful French imported Terra Cotta design of Christ and his apostles, above the front entrance, which she did with the assistance of Miss Mamie Dalton, by means of a party at Gray's in December of that year and a boat ride in May, 1908, aggregating \$315.00 a little more than the cost.

Christmas came, a very cold one it was, and the first Midnight Mass in the new church was celebrated, the congregation benumbed, as the stained glass windows were not yet made. The order for same had already been placed with the firm of G. C. Riordan and Co. of Cincinnati, amounting to \$3500.00, but as the sash work from the factory of the Trelhue Cypress Mill of Patterson, took time, then had to be shipped to Cincinnati, it was January, 1906 before the windows arrived and were installed. By the end of the year nearly all the families had cashed up, and the windows were paid for.

On that account no fair was given that year. Instead, a financial body was organized February 24, 1906, called the Sacred Heart Association. Leaders in this were: Chas. L. Wise, Chairman and President; Dr. S. J. Bourgeois, Secretary; Mayor Thos. Shannon, Treasurer and E. A. Landry, Collector. Active members forming administration committee, were: Jos. M. Dyer, Maurice Shannon, Frank Price, Dan Lynch Sr., Willard Ditch, Aug. Soumellian, N. L. Rogers, Frank Gianfala and E. F. Boudreaux; others were: Ed. Rollingson, A. Boudreaux, L. A. Guidry, Aurelien Songe, F. Chaisson, Vic Bouterrie, E. LeBlanc and John Gillen. The association lasted 10 months (December 1906) and raised and applied \$1395 to the church debt, as per statement of the secretary.

On July 4 1907 a grand fair at City Hall under auspices of Mrs. Wise netted \$600 a smaller one, December 1 at Convent grounds, by the children of Mary recently organized, brought \$190.

In April 1908 a subscription of \$410 was collected by Mmes. Thos. Shannon and Fred Miller to pay the Norgress-Menefee Lumber Co., for tongue and groove lumber. In May, the \$240 statue of the "Sacred Heart Blessing", in the front Niche donated by Mr. Prohaska was blessed, Miss Leta being sponsor, assisted by her companions of the children of Mary. About that epoch the pastor em-
