played the skilled mechanic Frank Hall to build the 22 pinnacles on walls, the two cement crosses on transepts and various mouldings on the front. The grand fair on November 8 of that year brought \$804.

After 1908 the history of the church remained uneventful. Each year the customary fair was given, with varied successes, also raffles, church collections and numberless small benefits interspersed, the money being applied on debt as fast as made. January 1909 was the Lachman's Carnival Benefit amounting to \$270. May 15 The Berwick Amateurs netted \$35 and November 14, the ninth fair brought \$750.00; November, 1910, \$786.00, in which Japanese games and booths were first introduced by Mrs. Shannon; November 17th, 1911, \$660.00; December 8, 1912, \$570.00; November 17, \$440.00; November 6, 1914, \$405.00. Finally December 10, 1915, \$404.00, plus street fair percentage of \$93.00. As can be observed, after the banner year of 1904, and the disbanding of the Sacred Heart Association in 1906, the yearly proceeds of the fairs have gradually decreased. To seek the cause is beyond the writer's ability. If we be permitted, however, to venture an opinion, perhaps might we not say that those good old families of Morgan City which for two generations have been the pillars of the church and during these eighteen years of the present pastor's charge, have borne the burden of the heat and day, feel well nigh exhausted, and are hoping for the new comers to come to their rescue in this labor of charity and love like the reserves in the war in Europe, which are continually poured in the trenches to relieve their tired and blood bespattered comrades? To you therefore, we appeal, new residents of Morgan City, no matter how poor you may be, you have an opportunity of sharing both in the glory and the merit before God of completing this beautiful monument, which when finished shall be the pride and inheritance of your children and children's grandchildren. The old debt has been completely wiped out. The note due on cement steps and extra front walk laid down in December, 1914, costing \$468.00, has been reduced to— thanks to the recent grand minstrel performance of August 23. The road is clear, the future is bright. Catholics of Morgan City will you prove laggards, or will you emulate the noble examples of your forebears? Just think, the church so far represents a round sum of \$30,000. There are 600,000 bricks in it. Suppose we ignore other items, we find by simple calculation that each one of those bricks represent 5 cts! Think of all the poor, represented by those 600,000 nickels, and who have not the satisfaction to see their names in public print, because of lack of space! But their names are there on the Record, which God forbid should ever be lost! They are still better cherished in the memory of Him who never forgets, who promised that a cup of water given in His name would not go unre-

warded, and who on the last day shall render unto all according to their works! Your poor Catholics, whose number is never diminished, because Christ has said, "The poor you shall always have", will you not feel honored by doing, what others, like yourselves have done before? Will you let poverty, or the worn out phrase of "Hard Times" keep you from doing your share?

Ponder seriously, while you scan at leisure those "Echoes from the Past" wherein many of you have been "movies actors" traced by your Pastor to be preserved in everlasting remembrance, "Lest we Forget".

This narrative would not be complete if we omitted to record the grand mission of March 1912 given by the Passionist Fathers, Sutton and Adelbert of fiery eloquence, the like of which have never been heard in this town, before or since. We will add; it is our hope to be able to give another mission, next spring probably by the Jesuit Fathers whose very mention, needs no eulogy.
