NEWS FLASHES FROM NEAR AND FAR

King Constantine of Greece is ill.

It is feared that Greece will join the British and French at Saloniki.

It is reported that Bulgaria will quit the Kaiser and join the Allies.

The Crown Prince of Greece, Andrew has arrived at Windsor Castle, England.

The inclement weather raging in France prevent attacks along the Somme front.

Reports from San Juan, Porto Rico says the storm damages will approximate one million dollars.

A bell-boy in one of the hotels in Chicago gets a fortune amounting to \$700,000 but he sticks to his job.

Roumanian troops invade Hungary at three points and are successful in breaking the line at one point.

The North Louisiana Co-operative Association of Shreveport has decided not to sell cotton seed for less than \$40 this season.

The number of applications for state automobile licenses show an increase by more than eight thousand compared with last year.

Secretary Lansing and the Mexican Ambassador have now agreed that the International Commission will meet in Portsmouth, N. H.

Striking lumber workers in Macon, La., hold out for higher wages. They demand restoration of scale prevailing before the war.

Bandits crossed the border near Presidio Texas, yesterday and drove off nineteen head of stock from American ranches, so it is reported.

A prosperity wave sweeps the land say insurance agents. Six hundred underwriters report record business in all parts of the United States.

The Kaiser has appointed Gen. von Hindenburg Chief of the general staff of the German army. Vice-Gen. von Falkenhayn has been dismissed.

"Lieut" Robert Fay, convicted in the German munitions plot conspiracy in New York, made his escape yesterday from the Federal prison in Atlanta, Ga.

Brokers in New Orleans are reaping rich profits as wheat price touches the "sky." It is reported that one firm last Saturday has been taking profits of \$2.25 a barrel on flour.

Mr. Sanders who formerly conducted a saloon in Smithtown, Pa., has quit his business to become a preacher of the gospel and has been appointed pas-

tor of a Presbyterian Church.

A Japanese princess of the Imperial family, "a daughter of the Gods" is to marry a foreigner, the son of the ex-emperor of Korea. This is the first time that such an event will take place in Japan.

Italy has finally declared war on Germany. The Italians cheered the announcement of the government. Italy having had a long entente with Roumania it is predicted that Roumania will follow Italy and join the Allies.

Opelousas men declare Carriere is recovering, don't believe prisoner will go to St. Landry. The reward has not been paid nor is it likely to be paid so long as Carriere is not delivered to authorities of St. Landry Parish.

A Swiss-American embroiderer returning recently to his native land in Switzerland was jailed by the British as a German spy and then after reaching his native soil, was arrested by the Germans for having American gold in his pockets.

Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt has been decorated by the French government for distinguished nursing services and the Duchesse of Choiseul, nee Claire Conder of New York, is also to receive a gold medal for tending troops afflicted with infectious diseases.

Whether there shall be a Federal investigation of the high cost of flour and the prospective increases of bread prices depends largely on the report of Commissioner Hurley who is in Chicago making informal inquiries for the Federal Trade Commission.

The house postoffice committee took favorable action on Representative Harrison's bill authorizing the issue of a special stamp in connection with the Gulfport Exposition next year to commemorate to centenary of the admission of Mississippi to the Union.

Plans to kidnap Roland Harriman, son of Mrs. Harriman, for a ransom of \$100,000 or to blind him and disclose him for life in case the ransom is not paid have been frustrated by the arrest of the conspirators at St. Anthony, Idaho, where the boy is spending his vacation.

The gold dust swindle in which the jewelry firm of David R. Miller and Brothers, of New Orleans are alleged to have been victimized by Felix Ferrer, resulted in a suit in the civil district court Tuesday for the recovery of \$1,900, the amount the Millers claim they paid Ferrer and R. Perez.
