THE HOUSTON TO NEW ORLEANS TRIP.

The announcement in the Morgan City Daily Review Thursday of the proposed automobile tourist trip from Houston to New Orleans created considerable interest here among autoists and it is probable several cars from Morgan City will join the large number passing here on September 19th. The Old Spanish Trail between Houston and New Orleans will be traversed by the party for a journey to the Crescent City to get a complete survey of this famous old road is the purpose of the trip. While the route has been extensively advertised as the All-Southern Highway, it is known that parts of it are almost inaccessible from neglect. After the trip it is hoped that connection will have been established with the Louisiana Highways and that the thoroughfare will be maintained as far west as

Houston. The delegation will leave Galveston and Houston Sunday morning headed by the official car of the Chamber of Commerce of Houston. Many private cars will follow, at various places along the road other good roads organizations and enthusiasts are to show their interest in the venture by adding more cars to the delegation. An early start from Houston Sunday morning is the program. That night is to be spent in Lake Charles. By Monday night the party expects to be in New Iberia and Tuesday noon in Morgan City. Donaldsonville is the next nightly stop and at noon next day New Orleans is to be reached. At New Orleans the Houston delegation is to meet representatives of the Spanish Trail Association from Mobile. Present plans are to hold a

joint meeting with these representatives and work out a basis for co-operation for developing the Spanish Trail route as a highway for cross country touring in the South. Entertainment at New Orleans will be in the hands of the Rotary Club the Association of Commerce and other organizations. Towns and cities along the route will contribute other entertainment for the visitors. In order to have the route clearly outlined the Good Roads Bureau of the Chamber of Commerce at Houston has obtained the service of Prof. B. K. Voghan, highway expert of the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College. He will cover the route to New Orleans before Sunday, probably passing through Morgan City today. Along the route he will arrange for the reception of the Houston delegation and when necessary will have the road put in condition.
