Prince Frederick William of Hesse was killed in action.

Renewed efforts were made to avert the threatened English railway strike.

W. C. Binkley of Cleveland, O., was burned to death in a garage fire at Monroe, La.

Two insane murderers escaped from the Louisiana Hospital for the Insane at Jackson.

Allied forces in France smashed the German lines north of the Somme along a six mile front.

King Constantine discussed quite frankly the gravity of the war problem now confronting Greece.

A drastic extension of the Allies' demands on trade with neutral countries threatened grave complications.

Eighty thousand workers are expected to quit work in New York Monday in sympathy with the striking car operatives.

The American-Mexican Commission considered a plan to hunt down Mexican bandits with a selected force of mounted police.

The Louisiana Railroad Commission issued an order under which two cent mileage books are expected to replace 2.44 cent books on Louisiana railroads.

Application of stock breeders associations for half-fare return rates on animals exhibited at fairs was granted by the Louisiana Railroad Commission.

David Lloyd-George charged that German agents have started a deliberate campaign in the United States to impugn the good faith of

the British government in its use of the censorship.

President Wilson decided to challenge at the earliest opportunity the statement by Charles E. Hughes that the basis on which the railroad strike was averted was an increase in wages.
