JEWISH HOLIDAYS.

According to the notice which is appearing in the Daily Review, our Jewish friends are to close their business houses from six o'clock on the evening of September 27 until six o'clock on the evening of October 1, and also from six o'clock on the evening of October 2 until six o'clock on the evening of October 8th.

The first celebration which is observed by the Jewish people throughout the world reminds them of the building of the great wall around Jerusalem by Nehemiah, on the 25th day of the month Elul (September) of the same time, as of old the Jewish people are making a religious confession of God's goodness and of their own wickedness. It is called the "Sabbath of Repentance" altho occurring from Wednesday evening until Thursday morning and is preparatory to the annual celebration from the evening of October 6th to the evening of October 7th at six o'clock, "The Day of Atonement." This is the day on

which the High Priest entered into the Holy Place, offered sacrifice for his sins and then offered another sacrifice for the people and finally Aaron "shall bring the live goat" shall lay both his hands on the head of the live goat and confess over him all the iniquities of the children of Israel "putting them upon the head of the goat and shall send him away by the hand of a fit man into the wilderness."

"And this will be a statute for ever unto you; that in the seventh month, Tishi (October) ye shall afflict your souls and do no work" — Lev. 16.

GOOD ROADS PIONEER IS HEADED FOR LOUISIANA

Good roads advocates are watching with interest the progress towards Louisiana of J. D. Clarkson, general manager of the Jefferson Highway Association who is expected here shortly to map out the route through this state which will connect with Winnipeg, Canada. President P. M. Miller of the Louisiana

Good Roads Association has just returned from a motor trip to Kentucky and will actively participate in the movement to arouse the right sort of reception to the good roads agent, Representative M. L. Alexander, who has announced his intention to lead the movement for good roads bond issues at the next session of the legislature is now en route to New York via automobile and says he has promises of support from all sections of the state. His vigorous eleven-hour campaign at the last session when the Twenty Million Dollar Bond Bill lost by only two votes gave tremendous impetus to the good roads propaganda thruout the state and Governor Pleasant is expected shortly to name the commission of five which will report on the good roads problem at the next session, and it is generally conceded that Representative Alexander's leadership will entitle him to a place on the commission probably as chairman. Mr. Alexander is one of the strongest Pleasant men in the state and one of the big business men and farmers who is an exponent of good roads. His home town of Alexandria and Rapides parish are examples of what good roads sentiment will do. The managers of the National Farm and Live Stock Show are taking a big interest in the good roads movement and are actively aiding it.
