#### CLEAN HOUSES SELDOM BURN

Rubbish in Closets, Cellars and Attics a Frequent Cause of Fire

Every year there is burned up—absolutely destroyed—property valued at more than \$250,000,000. About \$750,000 a day goes up in flame.

It is estimated that 65 per cent of all the fires take place in homes and it is stated that approximately 90 per cent of all fires are due to carelessness, ignorance or both. In other words, nearly 60 per cent of all fires in the homes might be prevented if people would take the slightest precaution, first to prevent the fire from starting, and second, to distinguish it immediately after it does start.

One of the greatest hazards on the farm is rubbish. This country is filled with old farmhouses too frequently with piles of rubbish, the accumulation of years, which are constant invitations to fire and a constant invitations to security to those who live in the house.

What shall we do with the old chair? Put it on the attic.

What shall we do with the old pile of magazines? Put it in the attic.

Here is an old roll of carpet, what shall we do with it? Put it in the attic.

These are the questions and these the answers that have resulted in attics being filled with rubbish. It may not be kind to call the chair in which one's grandmother sat rubbish, but it is rubbish if it is tossed aside, not used, allowed to become dusty.

Throw away the useless things in your home and you will quickly eliminate half the danger of fire. If a chair has served its usefulness, throw it away, burn it up, do anything you wish with it except—put it in the attic.

Don't let dark corners and cellars be filled with old things that you don't want either. See that your farmhouse is swept and garnished and that the dark places are clean.

flame finds ready food on which to grow great and grow, and another is wiped out.

Such simple causes destroy thousands of homes in this country every year. But these fires are due to carelessness and nothing else. It is carelessness to permit the rubbish to accumulate just as much as it is for Willie to drop the match. It is just as careless to build a fire trap as it is to burn one through lack of proper precaution.

If you are going to build a house far removed from town or city's fire protection see that it is built safely. The cost is a little more maybe, but the chance of its destruction is lessened mightily.

Do not store damp hay. It is a prolific cause of fire. In test made out in an open field, matches placed in the center of a haystack that had not been thoroughly cured, started that haystack burning in less than three hours.

An oily rag tossed under a kitchen sink may begin to smoke and then burst into flame, while the one who threw it there is sleeping. Spontaneous combustion starts many an unexplained fire. Matches should be kept in metal covered receptacles and high enough from the floor to keep children getting to them.

Every farmhouse should contain, at least, rudimentary means of fighting fire when it starts. There should be small hand extinguishers that a child or woman can use. There should be water pails in the entry way and the pails should not be used for scrubbing floors, that is why round bottom pails are better for fire use than flat bottom pails. Round bottom pails cannot be carried about and used. Every room above the ground floor should be provided with at least a rope, it not a portable fire escape, there should be a ladder outside of the house long enough to reach the ridge pole of the house.

These things are inexpensive, but they may mean saving your home from destruction. Saturday, October 9, is Fire Prevention Day, anniversary of the great Chicago fire. See that on that day your home is free from rubbish and that you have some means of protecting yourself from the flames.

#### News Flashes from Near An. 1st

British and French delivered a smashing blow at the German lines, driving a wedge a mile deep from Martinpuich to Comblies, six miles.

Germans sent a new flock of Zeppelins over England Monday night with results not fully reported.

It was reported that the situation in Greece was most serious; that 30,000 armed Cretans were in possession of the island and that former Premier Venizelos had gone to Saloniki.

Berlin admitted that two Zeppelins failed to return from the raid Saturday over London.

President Wilson told grain dealers in convention at Baltimore that new national commissions give business men of America means to expand foreign trade wonderfully.

Trial of Assistant State Revenue Agent B Galloway of Mississippi for violation of the cattle dipping and quarantine law resulted in his acquittal at Jackson.

Colonel Frank P. Stubbs, commanding the first Louisiana Infantry Regiment, returned to Monroe, La., saying the men were commended for their good behavior while in the federal service.

Strike leaders in New York City admitted the vote of a general walk-out Wednesday showed only 40 per cent in favor of the plan, and seemed to prepare for a long struggle.

A Carranza sergeant was shot and killed by an American trooper, who is held by the Carranza commander despite a request by General Pershing that he be released to the custody of the United State forces.


Westly E. Jones of Bailey, Iowa, was arrested in New Orleans on a Mississippi warrant charging bigamy.




