Estimates of the amount of kind of sugar to be made in Louisiana in the coming grinding fix the production of plantation granulated sugar at about 65,000,000 pounds; the production of white clarified at 60,000,000 pounds and the production of yellow clarified at 95,000,000 pounds. The open kettle sugar production of 1916 is estimated at 3,500,000 pounds and the test of sugar production will be somewhere in the neighborhood of 150,000 tons. Some of the test sugar, about 20,000,000 pounds at most, will be refined on toll. The rest will be sold as raw sugar.—Louisiana Planter.
