REPORT OF POLICE JURY PROCEEDINGS.

Franklin October 4th, 1916

The police jury met this day in regular session with Hon. Chas. Frost presiding and the following members present: T. B. Kimbrough, W. N. Gooch, T. Aucoin and John R. Gabriel Haydel, Sidney J. Wolford, Arthur Olivier, Oscar Boudreaux, W. N. Gooch, T. Aucoin and John R. Drackett. Absent: John Pharr.

The minutes of the previous meeting, (with the exception of the Finance Committee, report of Inspector of Licenses, Treasurer's report, Sheriff and Tax Collector's report, E. L. Saucier's report and Engineer estimates No. 13; reading of which were on motion duly seconded (dispensed with) were read and approved.

Mr. Appenheimer of The Daily States, appeared before the Police Jury stating that they were getting out a special edition and that they would like to arrange for a write-up of the parish for which the parish would pay. On motion of A. E. Gahn seconded by T. B. Kimbrough it was resolved that no action be taken on the matter.

A communication from Constable Clements in regard to the warrants in his favor being held up by the police jury. After an explanation by Mr. Drackett, Mr. A. E. Gahn moved seconded by T. B. Kimbrough that T. Aucoin and John R. Drackett be appointed a committee to take up the matter of misunderstanding between Mr. Guidry and Mr. Clements and report the findings of their investigation to the police jury.

On motion of T. M. Kimbrough seconded by Gabriel Haydel it was resolved that Mr. Clements warrants now held up be sent in.

A communication from M. L. & T. R. R. in regard to a claim of \$5.53 for derailing cars near Ditch's switch was read and on motion of A. E. Gahn seconded by Sidney J. Wolford the communication was referred to engineer Loustalot for reply.

Moved by A. E. Gahn seconded by T. B. Kimbrough that special deputy

sheriff Stanley Boudreaux be paid the sum of \$85.00 and that his employment be discontinued after October the 7th.

Moved by T. B. Kimbrough seconded by A. E. Gahn that the president appoint a committee with himself as chairman to consider the matter of lights on automobiles and report at the next regular meeting—Carried. The president appointed T. B. Kimbrough and Sidney J. Wolford.

The reading of the reports of Clerk of Court, Sheriff and Tax Collector and Treasurer were on motion duly seconded dispensed with and the report filed.

The report of E. L. Saucier, Demonstrator Agent was read and on motion of A. E. Gahn seconded by Oscar Boudreaux was ordered filed.

A bill of \$100.00 was presented by Mr. Homer Hebert and on motion of T. B. Kimbrough seconded by A. E. Gahn a committee composed of Arthur Olivier, Gabriel Haydel and L. A. Loustalot were appointed to investigate this matter and make their recommendations to the jury at the next regular meeting.

Moved by W. N. Gooch seconded by Arthur Olivier that warrant No. 14819 favor of Miss Kate Gibbon and heirs of Charles Gibbon deceased for \$263.10 and warrant 14820 favor Adolphe Materne for \$47.50 be cancelled as the parties in whose favor they are drawn have been settled with by the Columbia Sugar Co. as per previous agreement with the police jury.

Mr. John C. Pooley of C. C. Hartwell & Co. of New Orleans, appeared before the police jury in regard to the heating apparatus at the jail.

On motion of T. B. Kimbrough seconded by Sidney J. Wolford, it was resolved that the Courthouse committee be authorized to have the necessary work done as soon as possible and as cheaply as possible.

There being no further business before the meeting on motion of Gabriel Haydel seconded by E. A. Gahn and carried same adjourned.

DIRECTORS PLEASED

The second meeting of the Board of Directors of the Morgan City Publishing Co., Inc. was held last night at eight o'clock in the office of the Company with a quorum present. The Board received reports from the Secretary of the Company, showing the sum of the improvements installed to date.

The Board also received and reviewed the statement submitted by Manager King, the report showing a steady increase in net earnings over last month, and the month before. The Directors complimented Mr. King upon the showing made to date, and decided to make one or two other minor improvements in the Plant, which will assist in decreasing monthly expenses, and aid in efficiency.

The Board expressed unanimous approval of all previous actions of the Management, and indicated a desire to do all possible in making the operation of the Plant an ultimate success.
