BABY SHOW BIG 4-DAY PROGRAM.

Visitors to the Louisiana State Fair this year, Nov. 1 to 6, will enjoy an innovation in the annual Baby Show, a 4-day entertainment, in the form of a Juvenile Congress of Nations. Under the plans outlined, a baby from every nationality in Shreveport will be selected for exhibition at the Congress which is to last three days. A preliminary survey shows that there are at least fifteen nationalities to draw from.

The Baby Show, at which about 200 little boys and girls will be judged scientifically by experts, will open November 1, which is the opening day of the fair, and run four days, through Saturday. On the closing day prizes including special medals, will be awarded with patriotic exercises in the Coliseum, to which the public is invited, the same as to the Baby Show itself.

Many nurses and club women and physicians will assist Mrs. Gordon Irons and Dr. J. M. Bodenheimer, superintendent and medical examiner, respectively, in conducting the show. If there are physical or mental defects in children entered and examined, they are pointed out free of charge, for correction, which is one benefit of the Baby Show.

Two football games will feature the sport during the celebration of School and College Day at the Louisiana State Fair November 4. Thousands of collegians and school folks, including pupils, teachers, parents and friends will be in attendance rooting for their favorite teams, and a lively demonstration is assured. GENERAL DISPLAY OF CORN AT FAIR.

With a view of encouraging the production of corn the State Fair Association offers attractive premiums each year at the Louisiana State Fair. The premiums offered in this department this year total \$500. The awards are for general corn exhibits, the adults juveniles and all other corn growers being eligible to compete.

Prof. A. F. Kiddy, professor of agronomy of the Louisiana State University, will again be in charge of the corn exhibition; George Bishop, Cordell, Okla., judge. This means that the department will receive the very best of attention.

Besides the distribution of prizes for best exhibits, there will be lectures in the corn department and instructions in the matter of selecting seed and using improved methods of planting and cultivation.
