NEWS FLASHES FROM FAR AND NEAR

Austro-Germans gained a mile and a half of Allied trenches by a violent offensive in Galicia.

Large consignments of tobacco from American shippers to Dutch and Scandinavian ports were held up by Great Britain.

Following the landing of the Allied forces at Piraeus there were scenes of intense kind by royalists at Athens and Greek troops were thrown about the French, to prevent a clash.

Earl Grey said Great Britain will not make representations to the United States on the U-53 raid until the American government has obtained full information on the matter.

Three more Greek ships, all made in America, were taken over by the Entente allies, and Vice-Admiral Fournet handed the Greek government a note of extremely grave character, according to a news dispatch.

The house of deputies of the Protestant Episcopal Church approved many changes in the book of common prayer.

Seven persons were burned to death in a fire in a New York dye factory.

Governmental sanction was given military instruction in sixteen colleges and universities of the United States.

Villa was reported to have gathered an army of 5000 in Chihuahua in paying them in silver, and to be operating to miles of railway.

Mr. Hughes denied in his speech at Sioux City, Ia., that secret influences dictated his course while he was governor of New York.

The Reserve mill of the Godchaux Company began grinding this season's crop last Sunday night.

Thousands of relatives and friends cheered the First Regiment, Mississippi Infantry, as it left Jackson for San Antonio.

Governor Pleasant and other well-known Louisians took part in the celebration to mark the formal opening of Baton Rouge as a port entry.

A Methodist minister was fined \$5 in Shreveport City Court for using blinding headlights on his automobile.

Prosperity, preparedness and conditions were discussed by H. E. Stockbridge, of Atlanta, president of the Farmers' National Congress, at the opening session at Indianapolis.

Military education for college students for commissioned officers of the army was discussed by a score of university and college presidents who obtained data from officers of the department.

Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Florida and Texas yellow pine men met in New Orleans to organize a million-dollar lumber exporting company.

On the twenty-fifth of this month, another wealthy American girl will transfer her millions to Europe and gain a title by becoming a princess. Miss Marguerite Draper of Boston, Mass. will become the bride of Prince Andrea Compagni of Rome, Italy.

Madam Miriam Ardini, operatic soprano of the Metropolitan Opera Company of New York insist on the privilege of expressing her temper in the manner that pleases her, and so, instead of tearing her hair and doing other non-sensical things, methods in the highest favors among prima donnas, she scrubs her kitchen floor and goes to market alone.

The Louisiana Good Roads convention is to meet in Shreveport, November 3 and 4. The features of the meeting will be discussion for constructive legislation and materials desirable. The Louisiana Good Roads Association is a voluntary organization composed of men who give their time to this work without remuneration.

The latest promise from Carranza is that he will destroy Villa, but American Peace delegates reply that he must make good before Pershing leaves.
