NEWS FLASHES FROM FAR AND NEAR

The Rumanians seemed to have succeeded, at all points, in checking the threatened Austro-German invasion.

Three hundred French Marines were transferred to within 400 yards of King Constantine's palace in the Greek capital.

Norway took the same position as that of the United States in its attitude toward belligerent submarines in territorial waters.

The Protestant Episcopal convention devoted much of the day to suggested changes in the Book of Common Prayer.

Settlement of the serious strike of oil workers in Bayonne, N. Y., was believed to be in sight.

Internal revenue reports showed that New Orleans was far from being an important center of traffic in prohibited drugs.

John Redmond urged the British House of Commons to trust Ireland and settle the Irish problem by courageously putting the home rule act into effect at once.

Two lives were lost, one at Mobile Ala., and one at Pensacola, Fla., and comparatively slight property damage was suffered in a tropical hurricane which swept over that section of the coast.

C. S. Hebert, chairman of the Republican state committee, declined to request E. J. Rodrigue to keep out of the race for Congress in the Third District in behalf of W. P. Martin.

A boiler in the lavatory of the Second Company Coast Artillery at Jackson Barracks exploded and was thrown upon company quarters where it crushed the roof, but was held by the beams.

Cheering crowds greeted President Wilson in ten New York cities.

Fine live-stock was shown at the Baton Rouge Fair.

Governor Pleasant left on a tour of North Louisiana to urge the adoption of constitutional amendments.

W. H. Hilbert, convicted of incest at Monroe, La., was taken to Shreveport, when mob-violence was feared.

All Weather Bureau warnings were ordered down, the gulf hurricane having passed inland.

Chairman Ross, of the committee on naval base, said data to be presented the federal commission is nearly complete.

Cotton futures passed the 19-cent line in New Orleans because of expected storm damage, and after recession remained at large advances, with 20-cent cotton predicted.

William Mc. L. Fayssoux, president of the New Orleans Levee Board, indorsed the project to build a seawall along the lake shore from West End to Spanish Fort.

Dr. Geo. Summey reported to the New Orleans Presbytery it spent \$11,487 for home missions the last year, more than twice the amount given by any Presbytery of the Southern Presbyterian Church.

HOUSEMAIDS FAMINE

New York, Oct. 18.—The State Bureau of Employment today reported a "desperate need" of cooks, housemaids and laundresses. Wages have risen to \$8 and \$10 a week, but still the demand cannot be met. The war has cut off the supply of "green-horns" and experienced houseworkers in many cases have doubled or tripled their income by entering munition factories or busy offices.

VILLA UPSET PLAN OF MEXICAN ENVOYS

Reports that Pancho Villa has reached the Hearst ranch at Babicora considerably upset the deliberations of the Mexican peace commission today.

The American delegates emphasized the point that if Villa had penetrated this far north, Carranza must begin his promised drive immediately or it might be necessary for Gen. Pershing to strike again and strike hard.

Senor Cabrera, head of the Mexican delegation replied that Carranza's new campaign against Villa had already begun and news of a clash was expected momentarily.

He explained that troops were being moved north in relays. The American replied that the present situation had become so grave that it demanded more than promises.

The advice of Gen. Bliss to the American delegate was that Gen. Pershing would be compelled to act immediately should Carranza's "drive" prove an idle promise.
