### HANDLING CUT TIMBER

Deterioration of Woodlot Products Can be Largely Reduced by Proper Preventive Measures.

The following advice about how to prevent loss in woodlot products after the logs have been felled or the logs hewn is taken from Farmers' Bulletin 715, Measuring and Marketing Woodlot Products. This Bulletin devotes 49 pages to methods of measuring trees and timber in the woodlot, and practical suggestions whereby the farmer can know what he is doing when he disposes of his timber.

"In handling cut timber," the authors advise, "a good rule to follow is to allow as little delay as possible between the felling of the tree and its manufacture into rough products. This means that sales should be arranged for prior to beginning cutting. It is often necessary or desirable, however, to put off the delivery of logs, bolts, poles, etc., until some months after cutting, either in order to allow them to season or because a good sale can not be arranged at once. A great deal of weight of freshly cut products is due to the water they contain, and a few months' seasoning will often reduce this to a marked degree, the amount of reduction depending, of course, on the climate, the weather, and the exposure to sun and air. At the same time, unless preventive measures are taken, the products are sure to deteriorate through decay, insect attack, checking, or some deterioration is apt to take place in any case if the delivery is put off for some time; but the amount can be greatly reduced by proper preventive measures.

"Logs and other round timber should never be allowed to remain long in the woods after cutting. As soon as possible they should be taken to a dry, well-aired, and unshaded area and placed on skids well off the ground; otherwise the opposite extreme should, if possible, be adopted, namely, of keeping the timber in water. Within a few days after the trees are felled the bark should be removed from the poles, posts, and other material which will not be injured by checking or season cracks. The end of the logs should be coated with paint, creosote, or tar. This will not only assist in preventing decay, but will also retard seasoning to some extent and thus keep the logs from checking badly.

"Poles should be peeled, and hauled or dragged to a place free from debris or rank vegetation and freely exposed to sun and wind. They should then be rolled upon skidways not less than 18 inches high, so that no part of them will rest on the ground. There should be only one layer of poles on each skidway. When ties are cut, it is usually cheapest and most desirable to haul them, unseasoned, directly to the railroad.

"Cordwood should be stacked in loose piles in a sunny, well-aired, and well-drained place free from rank vegetation. Two sticks on the ground running the length of the pile will keep it from contact with the soil and thus prevent decay in the lower layers.—Weekly News.

### CARRIERE AWAITS TRIAL SET FOR OCTOBER 23

Opelousas, La., Oct. 17.—Following the arraignment and setting for trial of the case of State of Louisiana vs. Helaire Carriere, for the murder of Sheriff L. Swords, there is little or practically no excitement over the court proceedings in connection with the bandit trial, as was anticipated.

Carriere, as was expected, filed an appeal for a change of venue, averring that he would be unable to secure a fair and impartial trial, and the court will give the venue plea a hearing October 23. The motion was offered by Attorney Rosenthal, who is representing Carriere.

Ever since his return by Sheriff Reid from Lake Charles to Opelousas, Carriere has maintained perfect composure, and when he marched through a large and orderly crowd of spectators into the court house for his arraignment, glanced smilingly from side to side and calmly puffed a cigarette. The indictment for murder was read by Clerk of Court Lastrapes, and Carriere was sworn. In a low voice he pleaded "not guilty."

The sheriff slayer presented a very favorable appearance in court.

### OATS AND HAIRY VETCH

A Winning Combination for Small Farmers

The greatest problem that confronts the small farmer next to that of making a living is improving the fertility of his soil. A step towards the solution of this problem and that of producing feed for the work stock can be made by planting oats and hairy vetch together. This crop will produce as much or more feed per acre than corn, the common dependence for feed; will produce it earlier in the year when corn is scarce and high-priced; can be made and harvested at much less cost; will permit of a second crop being grown with the first, and will leave the land for other feed or money crops during the summer. We do not hesitate to recommend this combination to the farmers of Louisiana. Oats and vetch should be planted at the same time, using two bushels of oats and from twenty to thirty pounds of vetch per acre. The planting should be done in October. Both crops mature at the same time in the spring. For feed they should be cut with the mower when the oats are in the dough stage at which time the vetch will not have matured a full crop of seed. The combination can be cured as hay, can be handled easily, and will make a complete feed for work stock.

The preparation of the land and the planting and harvesting of oats alone is well understood by all. The same methods apply to the growing of oats and vetch together except that the mixed seed should not be planted so deep as the oat crop is generally planted. Vetch also requires that the land be thoroughly inoculated for its growth. Frequently the first crop of vetch grown on a farm is almost a failure, due to the lack of inoculation. If the growth is unsatisfactory the first year it is always advisable to plant the same land to the crop the following year, when the growth will generally be successful. An objection to recommending the planting of vetch is the high cost of seed, and for this reason we should suggest that only a small area, an acre or less, be planted to begin with. Save the seed from this and increase the acreage the following years. Inoculate the first patch with commercial inoculating material. If a good growth is secured soil from this patch can be used to inoculate all of the land to be planted the following year. Every farmer should make it a practice to save his own seed from

every crop grown. When the crop is well established the practice should be made of allowing a sufficient area of oats and vetch to ripen and furnish all the seed desired for planting purposes. Purchasing the mixture of oats and vetch as they come from the thresher is much the cheapest way of getting a start with this crop.

Oats and vetch can always be harvested in May, thereby leaving the land free for the growing of lespedeza, soy beans, cowpeas, sweet potatoes, etc.

### WEDNESDAY'S STORM

Wind at one hundred miles an hour swept Pensacola harbor. Town cut off from outside world but wireless say one person and probably two more have been killed while damages will run from \$500,000 to one million dollars!

An earthquake shock which was felt in Atlanta at 4 o'clock yesterday wrought much damage throughout Georgia and Alabama. At Birmingham a number of chimneys were wrecked and office buildings throughout the city were rocked by the tremors.

Pensacola suffered the brunt of the hurricane which swept in from the Gulf of Mexico at the rate of over 100 miles an hour and although the town is cut off from communication from the outside world by wire last night. Wireless brought the news that one person had been killed in the city proper and two were reported killed on the outskirts.

The damage will run between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000.

Mobile suffered the second heaviest, one killed, four boats reeked, property damage of \$50,000 done and street car traffic and fire service almost demoralized.

The storm swept in from the gulf between 4 and 11 a. m. in the morning. At 7 o'clock the wind had attained a velocity of 57 miles an hour at Mobile and steadily increased, all communications being lost at 8 o'clock.

Pensacola reported a velocity of 72 mile an hour at 8 a. m., and a few minutes later all wire communication was lost and had not been restored up to 10 o'clock last night.

Communication by wire was established with Mobile at noon on one wire and on this the first news of the storm's velocity was told.

Lena Shamburg, a negro woman was killed by a live wire in the streets of Mobile, after the street cars had been taken from the streets at 8:30 o'clock and before the power could be cut off.
