Electric Portable Lamps add Attractiveness and Warmth During Winter Months

October with its first suggestion of winter's chill in the evening air, and the steadily lengthening hours of darkness is a time when every housewife begins to realize that winter is approaching, that the family must henceforth spend most of its leisure hours indoors, and there are ways and means by which the home may be made more attractive for the winter's entertainment and evenings at home. With unlimited financial resources it is comparatively easy to paint, re-paper, and re-furnish the home. In the average home, however, where the expense account has been depleted by the purchase of a supply of coal and fall house-cleaning such a method of changing the home surroundings cannot be adopted.

Housewives generally are coming to recognize that the greatest change of the home with the least expense is accomplished with the adoption of a change in lighting. It may be in the installation of Mazda lamps throughout, for strange as it may seem, there are many households which use electric lamps that have not yet discovered the saving in electricity effected by Mazda lamps. The adoption of the indirect system of illumination in the dining, living rooms and parlor offers another means of improving lighting conditions in the home. The change which involves the least expense, however, and which will often yield the most pleasing effects is made by the installation of portable table or reading lamps.

Portable lamps have grown so in popular favor that they are now made in a variety of shades, sizes and colors adapted to meet the taste of the most exacting purchaser. Indeed, the schemes or architecture in vogue today are well adapted for the exclusive use of portable lamps in lighting living rooms and parlors. For a living room portables of low intensity are usually chosen and used in combination with a few side lights when more illumination is needed for entertaining. Such a scheme, intensified by the arrangement of the living room furniture, imparts coziness to the surroundings and gives the "homey" touch, a quality often sought but seldom attained. There is, however, a knack in

selecting the type of portable best adapted to certain home surroundings, the proper selection being largely determined by the color and character of wall paper, hangings and furniture. Schemes for decorating may often be picked up from illustrated books, and from them hints on the type of portable lamp to be used may often be gleaned.

The selection of the proper design of portable lamp depends upon a few fundamental rules of decoration which it is well for the buyer to know. As a rule the base of the portable should be in harmony with the furniture. The shade should harmonize in color and design with the decorations. For example, oak or bronze bases should be used with mission furniture. While lacquer is suitable with French Gray bedroom suites, mahogany with any red finish and old gold with gilded-brass and onyx stands which still survive as relics of the nineties. Pale gray and white or black and white shades will harmonize with the gray or white paper so often used in bedroom suites. Shade materials may be bought in such a great variety of materials and colors that it is possible to obtain any result desired.

Portable lamps may be effectively used to enhance the charm and size of a small room. A portable lamp to illuminate a central table and bring out dimly the dark corners of the room will make the room seem larger. Such a lamp should shield the eyes from the rays of light coming from the lamps filament and at the same time afford sufficient illumination to allow reading beside it. Higher efficiency of illumination may be secured by choosing a lamp shade with white material.

A lamp of very low intensity is often sufficient to illuminate a hallway or other room which is seldom used but often traversed by the family. In such a place illumination may be sacrificed to secure decorative effect, and, therefore pottery lamp may be selected.

Dinner tables are most effectively illuminated with portables. A single lamp should be used. The base should be slender and the shade should not obstruct the view. The light sources should be screened, for it is impossible to keep them out of the line of sight. With this arrangement the table, the center of interest, is also made the center of illumination, and the rest of the room is left in obscurity.

Of the materials used in lamp construction, silk is undoubtedly the most popular. This is because it is low in price, light in weight, and may be obtainable in innumerable colors and textures. Paper is cheap and may be decorated by hand, and parchment is sometimes used. The wicker frame portable is especially adapted for use on porches enclosed for the winter. It harmonizes well with the wicker porch furniture.

Department stores, in some instances, have seized on the popularity of the portable electric lamp as an opportunity for selling the standards complete and allowing the housewife to choose a wire-frame and the necessary shade material for making her own shade. Electricians also have found a profitable field in making vases into portable lamps. This is easily done by fitting a metal cap to the top of the vase to hold the lamp and shade and drilling a hole through the porcelain bottom for the electric light cord to enter.

TWO OF CARRIERE'S CAPTORS HELD AS LEBLEU'S SLAYERS

Arrest is Effected in District Court

Lake Charles, La., Oct. 19.—Sheriff Henry A. Reid and Deputy Sheriff Calvin W. Harmon and Dallas Gross, a local business man, were arrested, just before noon this morning on a charge of being implicated in the murder of Fred Lebleu last June.

Reid recently led a posse that captured Hilaire Carriere and Harnen was a member of that posse. The warrant against them was sworn out by Zepherin Lebleu, father of the murdered man, and charges Sheriff Reid and Deputy Sheriff Harmon with the murder and Dallas Gross with being an accessory before the fact. The men protest their innocence and hint a "frame-up" is being attempted.

The arrest was effected very quietly in the District Court room, where a number of officials had assembled after the signing of the warrant. Coroner W. L. Fisher, who was present, was commissioned by Judge Winston Overton and served the warrant on the three men. Attorneys L. H. Moss and U. A. Bell then applied for a preliminary hearing, which will be held tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Coroner W. L. Fisher, who became acting sheriff by the arrest of Sheriff Reid, took the three men over to the parish jail, where they are spending the night. They expect to make bond in the morning, after the preliminary hearing is concluded, if they are not ordered released by the court.

The following statement, in which Harmon and Gross concur, was made this afternoon by Sheriff Reid:

"Fred Lebleu was my intimate personal and political friend. The charges against me in connection with this murder is outrageously false. I have asked for my immediate preliminary hearing, and the facts will be at once laid before the public. No 'frame-up' has ever succeeded against an innocent man in Calcasieu parish, and this is one against me and my friends will be torn to shreds when the truth comes to light."

LARGE INCREASE IN NUMBER OF AGRICULTURAL SCHOOLS

The demands from all parts of the State for agricultural schools indicates very plainly the sentiment of the people for improvement in agricultural methods and conditions. The number of these schools have increased from 37 in 1914 and 52 in 1916. They are located in 36 different parishes.

The primary purpose of the agricultural schools is to furnish instruction in the fundamental of agricultural practice to boys in the rural districts. Approximately 2,000 Louisiana farm boys are attending these schools. The class room work is supplemented by field work on the school farms, on which the best known methods of farming are in operation.

The agricultural schools of the state have proved to be of much value in many other respects, also, such as (1) demonstrating the large yields of Louisiana soils produce with proper cultural methods; (2) showing the good results that come from the use of improved varieties and quality of seed; and (3) showing which crops grow best in the different section of the state.

The work of the agricultural schools is supervised by a State inspector, who is employed jointly by Junior extension division of L. S. U. and the State Department of Public Education.—Press Bulletin.
