Complete Weather and Crop Report of Month Ending October 31st

Weather conditions in this section during October, while not altogether so good during September and August, continued favorable to the Farmers. The five and one-half inches of rainfall which fell on the 15th, 16th, 17th, and 18th of the month, proved of great value in placing the proper moisture in the ground for fall planting, while the dry spell preceding this rain was broken, causing the cane to take on renewed growth. The high winds on the 16th and 17th proved of value in shaking up the cane to the point of taking on additional height and size. The blow was not sufficiently strong enough to do great damage.

During October there were 24 clear days, with four days on which rain fell. The partly clouded days numbered four, while during three days no sun could be seen at all, except thru clouds.

The total precipitation for the month reached 5.60 inches, with the thermometer reaching its highest at 98 1-2 degrees Fahrenheit in the sun. The lowest record was 36 1-2 degrees.

The first week in October started the month off with very cool days and nights, which served to assist in maturing cane to the point of harvest. The past few days of October proved too warm for good results in the cane fields.

The general weather conditions, however, have not served to set-back the 1916 crop, and the prospects now for a bumper crop are as good as at any time during the past five months.

A safe estimate would place one-third of the 1917 crop already planted, with generally favorable conditions surrounding the fall plant cane. The ground is at present moist,

while early morning fogs serve to maintain a condition favorable to fall planting.

The European war, coupled with a kind Providence, has placed a smile on the farmers face that disguises his proverbial physiognomy.

Fall gardens are now being planted, and the good farmer is preparing to reap a richer harvest next year, both as to a money crop and as to a crop for his own consumption.

New Flashes From Near and Far

Provision trains destined for Chihuahua City were looted by bandits and the railway line from Juarez was rendered impassable.

Live-stock and agricultural displays at the Louisiana State Fair placed it on a par with the main fairs throughout the country.

The Federal State Commissioner and party returned from inspection of the lumber, turpentine and paper plants at Bogalusa and began a tour of smaller plants.


