News Flashes From Fram far and Near

Francisco Villa distributed through the state of Chihuahua proclamations threatening the death of every foreigner captured.

The White Star liner Britannic, being used as a hospital ship, was torpedoed and sunk with heavy loss of life.

Bandits help up the driver of a Southern Express Company transfer wagon at Chattanooga and obtained about \$40,000.

The American Federation of Labor went on record as opposed to military training in the public schools.

Judge Hughes sent to President Wilson a message congratulating him upon the result of the election.

New Orleans was not mentioned in plans of the Navy Department for improving navy yards with the \$6,000,000 dollars appropriated by Congress last summer.

Miss Jean Gordon was one of the speakers at the seventeenth convention of the State Federation of Women's Clubs opened in Hammond

A serious delay in the returns from the Presidential election in California was threatened.

Finding of a small skiff in which William McCausland rode on a duck-hunting trip near Mobile, Ala., resulted in hope of finding the Baton Rouge banker alive being virtually abandoned.

The Adamson eight-hour laws was held unconstitutional by Judge William Hook in the United States District Court in Kansas City.

ELECTRIC BRIEFS

Uncle Sam's army holds one patent right which places it ahead of other nations in the field of wireless instruments for the use on aeroplanes. It weighs but seven pounds and will transmit messages 7 miles.

An electric shoestring farm is operated by a Pennsylvania power company. The farming space is more than a mile long but only a few yards wide, for the land area includes the right of way for a high tension power line.

Steel ships sunk in the course of the present war may be raised with the aid of pontoons clamped firmly to the steel hull with big electric magnets. The magnets receive the electric energy from the generators of a ship on the surface.

Electric gasoline pumps may be installed at the curbs in place of the ordinary hand-operated pumps. Pressing a button starts the gasoline flowing and a pointer shows the customer just how much gasoline has been measured out to him.

"Baked by Wire" is the tag attached to loaves from the big oven of a progressive western baker. That the public prefers electrically baked bread is shown by the fact this particular baker has doubled his business by installing the electric ovens.

A "Muff Controller" is not an electrical device for keeping the hands warm. It is a stevedore's controller which may be carried about swung over the shoulders of the foreman. A flexible cable connects the controller to an electric winch and permits the foreman to operate the winch from a position where he may observe the loading operations, the raising or lowering of a cargo on a ship or dock.

"If they were human beings I would raise their pay," said the city manager of the Rock Hill to an engineer of the General Electric Company in speaking of two electric pumping motors depended upon for the municipal water supply. The motors were under water during the North Carolina flood for a day and a half but started promptly after the water receded and have been pumping every since.

The modern washerwoman, the electric washerwoman, is not the untidy individual with rough hands who "took in washings" a few years ago. A New Jersey widow who earned her living at the washboard recently purchased an electric washer on installment. It enables her to do more and better work than she had been able to do before and the cost for current is insignificant compared with the saving in labor.

LOUISIANA'S CAMPAIGN AGAINST TUBERCULOSIS

From now on a state-wide campaign against Tuberculosis will be actively pushed in Louisiana. Many states have recognized the danger of permitting consumption to menace the community, swell the death records and otherwise damage the status of certain localities. Boards of Trade are assisting to stamp out the disease. Press Associations are earnestly endeavoring to impart through the newspapers the necessary information to prevent and to cure consumption. Louisiana will do all in her power to make the state clean and healthy place for all her people. YOU are invited to help. As the various districts and parishes are organized in this Anti-Tuberculosis campaign, you will be advised for the part you are to take. Literature and information are available at the headquarters, 417 Cam St. Every man, woman and child will be an important factor in the "stamp out consumption" crusade.

South Carolina is making a fine effort to be a healthy southern community. In Illinois the school-children are enlisted. Reports from other sections show equal interest in this determined and universal work of ridding the country of an appalling yearly death-harvest. The living tuberculosis germs are contained in the spit by millions. These are easily scattered in the form of fine spray by coughing. When spit is cast on the floor or sidewalk it is easily tracked on the shoes. It then drives and mingles with the dust of the room. Dry sputum may also drop off in flakes from handkerchiefs or soiled clothing (such as coat sleeves, lapels or pillow-cases and sheets). It then gets pulverized on the floor. The fine spray from coughing and the dust containing these germs are readily inhaled and swallowed. The hands are frequently soiled with sputum. The food, especially of infants and children, is thus contaminated if the mother or cook has tuberculosis. The sputum is consequently the most dangerous source of tuberculosis. The milk of a tubercular mother seldom contains the germs, but the infant is easily infected from the mother's sputum, as already noted. Cow's milk (also butter and cheese) occasionally contain bacilli from cows that have the disease even slightly. The urine, feces and discharges from tuberculosis sores may occasionally cause disease, but are less common sources of danger owing to their manner of disposal. Infection takes place in three ways, the first two being common. By inhalation through the mouth or nose, of dust and sprays. By swallowing both the inhaled matter contaminated food. By inoculation into cuts or scratches and through gums.
