LOUISIANA STATE UNIVERSITY EXTENSION READING COURSES FOR FARMERS.

The Extension Reading Courses established by Dr. W. R. Dodson, Director of College Extension at the Louisiana Experiment Station early in the year has proved one of the most popular forms of Farmers' Short Courses ever offered in the State. Each year there is a large attendance at the regulars. Farmers' Winter Short Course in January at the Louisiana State University but there are hundreds of progressive farmers in the state who for many reasons are unable to avail themselves of the opportunities to attend these courses, because their farm work will not permit them to leave home.

However, this vast army of farmers realize they have many problems in the farm and the home that are continually demanding a satisfactory solution. A barren soil, an unprofitable herd of cattle or hogs, an insanitary home or an extravagant kitchen are only a few of the examples of the innumerable problems in life's great school. Years of experience and observation have enabled many to meet these problems with some degree of success. However, untold questions remain without an answer and on account of a lack of scientific knowledge many individuals are extravagantly experimenting, often getting little in return but the experience. If to this acquired experience there should be joined training in the latest scientific methods, the results would be infinitely more satisfactory.

Realizing that many citizens of Louisiana continue to be students even when their school days are over and appreciating the necessity of providing farmers who are unable to attend the Farmers' Winter Short Courses of the Louisiana State University with suitable reading material that would be helpful to them in their farm work. Dr. W. R. Dodson, Director of the College Extension and Col. T. D. Boyd, President of the Louisiana State University, perfected arrangements for the establishment of special extension reading courses for farmers.

Under this arrangement the Louisiana State University and A. and M. College are co-operating in the organization of Farm and Home Study Clubs for carrying on special

lines of reading, experimentation and investigation. Farmers who enroll as members of these clubs may take their choice of free reading courses in the following courses: 1, Soils; 2, Crops, and Crop Rotations; 3, Livestock and Feeding; 4, Dairying; 5, Poultry Farming; 6, Orchard; 7, Gardening; 8, Farm Management; 9, Home Economics. Bulletins and all necessary instructions are sent to each member free of charge. Reports on the amount of reading accomplished are sent in from time to time and careful supervision is given in all of the work.

That this undertaking is appreciated by the farmers of Louisiana is shown by the fact that although these extension reading courses have been available only during the last six months more than 1200 farmers have joined the Farm and Home Study Clubs and they are sending their applications at the rate of 200 a month. The present enrollment of 1204 is distributed as follows: For Soils, 353, Orchard 50, Gardening 86, Dairying 90, Poultry 96, Farm Management 52, Home Economics 64, Farm Crops 206 and Live Stock 207.

The membership of the Farm and Home Study Clubs is restricted primarily to the Parish Demonstration Agents with their Demonstrators and Co-operators, members of the Boys' and Girls' Agricultural Clubs, teachers of Agriculture and Domestic science in the Agricultural Schools and all progressive farmers who agree to co-operate with the Parish Demonstration Agents and with the Specialists of the Louisiana State University and the U. S. Department of agriculture.

The reading course adopted for the members of the Pig Clubs covers three years' work and prizes are to be given for the best records in each year's work.

All farmers who desire these free reading courses of the Farm and Home Study Clubs should address Mr. John W. Wilkinson, State Supervisor Farm and Home Study Clubs at the Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge.

TABLE D'HOTE TREE LATEST

The table d'hote tree is the scientific achievement of Prof. H. G. Walters, head of the Plant Research Institute at Langhorne, Pa.

"My table d'hote tree," said Prof. Walters, as he pointed to a fragrant blossom tree on the institute's lawn, "involved an ideal botanical idea that cannot fail to reduce materially the cost of living. These trees are peculiarly suitable for backyards. "Early last fall I grafted on this old peach tree clippings from a lilac bush, a raspberry bush and three varieties of rose bushes. These grafts are alive today, and the peach tree is also bearing healthy buds of its own. Later on we will have raspberries and roses and lilacs growing on this one tree.

"My next step will be to develop a special variety of these 'table d'hote trees,' which the poor can plant in their backyards, and which will bear a variety of eatables."

Several other combinations are said already to be the subject of earnest study and experiment. Cabbage, grapes and carrots are expected to grow on a gooseberry bush. A abundant tree will be grafted with shoots of potato plants and pumpkin vines. There is no reason it is said at the institute, why well-bred stalks of

sugar-corn cannot be persuaded to grow up and down on the sides of a tree as well as egg plants and red peppers.—Baltimore American.
