

Review and Toy Fund Should Pass The Hundred Dollar Mark Today

Weekly Episcopal Sunday School and Doric Lodge, and The "Here Am I" Circle, Send in Substantial Contributions. Fine Bunch of Bananas Received For The Work.

Three substantial contributions were received by the Review Monday for the Doll and Toy Fund. The Doric Lodge and the Here Am I Circle each sent in five dollars for the good work, and the Sunday school of Trinity Episcopal church contributed four dollars. This with several smaller individual offerings brought the total up to \$83.25. Tomorrow should see the fund pass the one hundred dollar mark.

The Sunday school of Trinity Episcopal church belongs to the honor of being the first Sunday school to assist the Doll and Toy Fund, and in fraternal relations the first interest was evidenced by Doric Lodge.

By the close of this week this fund should be doubled, by the various fraternal orders, Sunday schools, corporations and individuals, for it is a certainty that there are many more of the genuine good willers are going to help bring Santa Claus to the poor children of this fair city.

All contributions must either be sent to the Review, left at one of the banks or handed to some business man to turn over to the Review, as there will positively not be any collectors sent out in the interest of the fund.

The twenty-sixth day of December will be too late to do your part in this good unselfish work, you know

what the situation is, and you know that the King's Daughters, who will have charge of the buying and distributing of the dolls and toys will exert every possible effort to see that not one child is forgotten on the day that the world takes on some of the spirit of the Man of Gallilee. They can only do this insofar as the good people of Morgan City provide them with the funds necessary for this purpose. Besides devoting their times to the work, the King's Daughters are the largest contributors to the fund, having started it with thirty dollars which is more than one-third of the total at this time. Those good women are going to do the work, and it is going to be a labor of love. They are going into the highways and byways of the city, they will go to places where even though many people have spent their life in Morgan City, they have never been. They either know, or will find out where every child lives whose Christmas will be without meaning, unless Santa Claus finds some assistant to help.

If the good ladies would call and ask for your help in this work, they would get it. They are not going to call, but the fund needs your help, so send it in without being urged. Tell the people of the State there is no city within her borders where the spirit of the season is more genuine

than in Morgan City.
