MILITARY MEN TO SEE PHOTOPLAY

Herman Fichtenberg and the management of the Bluebird Photo-plays, Inc., will be the host to the Army and Navy Friday morning at 9:45 o'clock at the Globe Theater, when the Bluebird super-photoplay, "The Eagle's Wings," will be shown to the men from the torpedo destroyers Smith, Lamson, Sterret and Monaghan, now at the foot of Jackson Avenue, as well as the officers and crew of the gunboat Castine and Wheeling, docked at the Naval Station.

"The Eagle's Wings" is a plea for industrial and military preparedness, and will have its public presentation at one of the theatres here within the next few weeks.

Lieutenant S. M. Labounty, of the Navy Recruiting Station here, is lending the producers every co-operation possible for a dignified presentation of the photoplay, which was written by Rufus Steele of the Denver Post.

Officials of the Bluebird exchange called on Captain Watson, commander of the Wheeling, Thursday, but that officer was on an official visit to his colleagues aboard the quartette of destroyers. A formal invitation was extended him later in the afternoon, as he is the ranking senior officer of the port.

It is possible that 300 members of the ships' crew from the various destroyers and auxiliary cruisers will witness the presentation.—Times Picayune.
