Again: "He is the head of the body, the church." When did he become the head of the body? The eyes of your understanding being enlightened; that ye may know what is the hope of his calling and what the riches of the glory of his inheritance in the saints, and what is the exceeding greatness of his power to us-ward who believe according to the working of his mighty power, which he wrought in Christ, when he raised him from the dead and set him at his own right hand in heavenly places, and gave him to be head over all things to the church.

Then, if he was never given to be the head of the church until he was set at his Father's right hand and obtained his exalted name, it follows: That if the church or body existed prior to that time it was a body without a head; and for the very same reason, if the kingdom, church, or body was not then set up, Jesus was a king without a kingdom—a head without a body—and the spirit was upon the earth without a habitation or dwelling place. While the kingdom was yet in prospect Jesus taught the people by parables and figures, but after its establishment figures gave place to facts; commands, and promises. Jesus commissioned his apostles to preach the gospel to every creature promising salvation to those who would believe and obey it. He also promised them the Holy Spirit to guide them into all truth and enable them to unerringly perform the duty he had assigned them. When it came they began to preach as it inspired them; persons were ent to the heart and made to cry out: "Men and brethren what shall we do." Peter did not tell them to be born again, because the time of figures had passed. He therefore said to them: "Repent and be baptised every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins." Then he told them plainly, without a figure, to do that which would translate them into the kingdom of God's dear Son, and produce that change of state indicated by the figurative language of Jesus as used in the conversation with Nicodemus when he said: "Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." The first pentecost after the resurrection of our Saviour was the birth-day of the Christian Church. To the good brethren of all the denominations, I appeal to you: Is this not all plain, and are not the commands and laws by which this grand organization is governed, equally plain? Then why have divisions and strife among us? Why not unite upon the one glorious plan of salvation as taught by the inspired apostles? Jesus, as king, has but one kingdom; a head, has but one body; as bridegroom, has but one bride, and is the Author of but one church. His people should be one people, and have no divisions among them.
