POTATO RAISERS URGED TO STORE PRODUCT

EXTENSION SERVICE OFFERS PLANS OF POTATO HOUSES AND PERSONAL ASSISTANCE.

WOULD CONSERVE FOOD

Unless Sweet Potatoes Are Housed It Is Difficult To Keep Them Properly.

The Extension Division of the Louisiana State University, co-operating with the Bureau of Markets, is encouraging sweet potato growers throughout the state to store their produce. This work is under the supervision of G. L. Tiebout, of the Extension Division, assisted by E. W. Gardner and Richard Nesom from the Bureau of Markets.

The object of this work is primarily to aid the farmer in saving his sweet potato crop and also is a food conservation measure.

At present there are 5,000,000 bushels of sweet potatoes produced in Louisiana with storage houses sufficient to adequately preserve approximately only 300,000 bushels. Unless sweet potatoes are stored properly it is a difficult task to keep them in good condition.

Plans, specifications and personal help can be secured by those who expect to store sweet potatoes by writing to the Extension Division, Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge.

LET SWEET POTATOES MATURE BEFORE DIGGING

Crop Should Be Carefully Handled, Well Cured and Kept at Uniform Temperature.

To keep sweet potatoes in good condition they must be (1) well matured before digging, (2) carefully handled, (3) well dried or cured after being put in the house, and (4) kept at a uniform temperature after they are cured. The grower can judge when his sweet potatoes are ripe by breaking or cutting one of them and leaving it exposed to the air for a few minutes. The cut or broken surface remains moist if it is not ready to be dug.

The second essential, careful handling, should be observed in digging, gathering, hauling, and unloading. Sweet potatoes should be sorted in the field and gathered in padded baskets or boxes to prevent bruising or breaking the skin. The baskets or boxes should be loaded on the wagon, hauled to the storage house, and the potatoes carefully placed in the bins. When they are to be hauled very far, a wagon with bolster springs should be used. Sweet potatoes should never be grown from one row to another, loaded loosely into a wagon body, or hauled in bags, because either of these practices will bruise them and afford an opportunity for disease to enter.

The third and fourth essentials, thorough drying and a uniform temperature, may be secured in a storage house where artificial heat can be supplied. The house must be constructed in such a way that it can be thoroughly ventilated when necessary and yet be made nearly airtight in cold weather.
