### Educational Movement.

Reports from every part of Louisiana indicate enthusiastic support for the great educational movement now under way in Southern Methodism. Although the actual drive does not begin until the 29th of May, two pledges for large amounts have already been made—one for \$100,000.

The Louisiana conference with a membership exceeding 40,000 will be called upon to contribute \$1,027,000. Of this sum, 700,000 is to be returned to Centenary College at Shreveport and \$210,000 will go to supply the needs of Mansfield Female College.

Both of these institutions of learning are under the Louisiana Methodist conference.

Total sum to be raised during the educational campaign aggregate \$33,000,000 of which the two great Methodist universities at Dallas and Atlanta will receive more than \$6,000,000.

The funds raised in this campaign will be used to enlarge and to endow schools throughout the the bounds of Southern Methodism.

### Local School Boosted

Supt. T. H. Harris: Herewith is my report on the Glenmora school in Rapides Parish:

This school is possibly the best equipped in the State and has everything needed for the best work. The room given to agriculture is large, well lighted and furnished with tables, cabinets, closets, etc. The work shop is without doubt as good as any in the South and will be put in use next session.

I was pleased with all the school room work and especially with laboratory notebooks. The only thing that I did not find as good as it should be was the project record books. For some reason it seems almost impossible for the teachers to record their project work satisfactorily. In many cases, however, I have visited projects that were very good in every respect, but on examination of the record books found out they did not show the work actually being done.

The farm which consisted, less than two years ago, of a tract of undrained cut over land full of stumps and trash of every kind has been cleaned and drained and will be planted to different crops this year. The farm owns several brood sows and this fall a large number of hogs will be fattened and put on the market.

### ORDINANCE #5

Declaring the results of the municipal election in the Town of Glenmora, Louisiana, on Tuesday the 19th day of April, 1921.

Whereas, in accordance with law, an election was held in the Town of Glenmora, Louisiana, on Tuesday, April 19th day, 1921 for the purpose of electing a Mayor, Marshal and five Aldermen for the Town to serve for the ensuing two years, and

Whereas, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen met in special and open session at the Town Hall, on Tuesday the 19th day of April, 1921, at the hour of 8 o'clock P. M. for the purpose of receiving the returns of the Commissioners and Clerk of said election, canvassing same and declaring the results thereof, and

Whereas, the said election was duly and regularly held, and the Commissioners and Clerk of said election made returns thereof to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen and the said Mayor and Board of Aldermen have examined and canvassed said returns, which examination and canvass show the following:
