ORDINANCE NO. 86

Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Glenmora in regular session convened: That it shall be unlawful to allow the engine of any motor propelled vehicle to run while within the corporate limits of the Town of Glenmora, with what is commonly known as the cut out of the exhaust open, or to allow the exhaust to escape unmuffled, and further, it shall be unlawful to race said engine or to create any unnecessary, useless or unreasonable noise in operating; same within said corporate limits.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained etc., that any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be arrested and upon conviction shall be fined not less than one (1) dollar and not more than one hundred (100.00) dollars and in default of payment of said fine shall be imprisoned for not more than thirty days, or both fines and imprisonment at the discretion of the court.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained etc., that all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, be, and the same are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained etc., that this ordinance shall be published in the local paper for a period of thirty days.
