Why Not Make a True Statement?

Bogalusa, Oct. 5—Your corres-
pondent, anxious to hear the
news as to what Aswell did
throughout the Parish of Wash-
ington during his tour, visited
every point covered by that
gentleman, and in every instance
he was told that Aswell instead
of making friends has made
enemies by his attacks upon
Judge Hall, claiming that Hall
would carry, as well as all those
that have announced their affilia-
tion with the Good Government
league, the entire parish by a
good majority.

The people of this point are
not doing much talking, but all
are loud in their desire for a
change, not only in state but
parish as well.

There are five candidates in the
field for sheriff, the consensus of
opinion being that Mr. Thomas
Simmons will be a sure winner.

The Clerk of Court has no
opposition, but the State senator-
ial race is waxing hot between
Joe Magee and Jack Alford, the
Good Government candidate, who
will receive probably two-third of
the vote.

Another interesting fight will
be between Coroner Brock and
Dr. Pierce of Bogalusa for
coroner, Dr. Pierce's friends say
he will be elected beyond a doubt.

There is a fight between Delos
R. Johnson, an Aswell man; and
T. E. Bennett, Good Government,
for the office of representative.
Mr. Bennett, his friends say, is
not much of a talker, but is do-
ing effective work and will be
elected.

The Hall people are delighted
with the situation and say that all
they want is a fair election to win.

Every one has given up the
idea that Aswell is in the race,
claiming that the contest is be-
tween Mr. Hall and Mr. Michell.

The above was published in
The Item one day last week and
in the Bogalusa American on
Saturday last. We know the
article is entirely without founda-
tion in fact or in truth. We do
not know who The Item's re-
porter at Bogalusa is, we would
be glad if we did. We rather
suspect he is one of these "Squaw
men" who can only talk but vote
at the January primary—never.

We venture the suggestion that
that, the author of this article
has never visited Mt. Herman,
Gorman, Hackley Pine, Enon,
nor Franklinton. We venture to
say that he is entirely partisan
and cares but little whether he
states the facts or not. This we
do know that he positively mis-
represents the situation.

At Mt. Herman Dr. Aswell
gained many votes and did not
lose a single one. At Gorman,
Hackley, Pine and Franklinton it
was the same and if he lost a
single vote in Bogalusa we have
not been able to find it but on
the contrary many came into his
fold. It is our opinion, and we
base our opinion upon what we
have learned from traveling in
every ward in the parish, that
Dr. Aswell will get as many votes
in this parish as both of his
opponents put together.

We have in Washington Parish
a few "Pea-nut" politicians who
like to be recognized but up to
date the only notice they get is
from the noise they make and
the stunk they raise. This paper
is now, as it always has been
entirely neutral in local politics.

We believe that our readers are
capable of choosing their parish
officers without an expression
from us because they are as well
acquainted with the candidates
as we are, and they know as well,
conditions, etc. throughout the
parish.

This "Squaw man" reporter
from Bogalusa seems to be
anxious to "Line 'em up" just as
we suggested some weeks ago
that there seemed to be a move-
ment of this kind on foot. We
do not believe the candidates
themselves will be willing to be
"lined up" in any such a manner.
If such a thing could be, it would
certainly be disastrous to those
who participate.

The Goo Goos, who are follow-
ers of Hall, cannot hope for him
to win in this parish, and if a
local candidate should allow his
name and chance of election, to

be tied to the tail end of the Hall
caravan, he will certainly make a
mistake. And on the other hand
do not think you can win because
you believe in some other candi-
date for Governor. Leave the
race for Governor alone, to be
fought out by the men asking for
that office, and look to the people
who know you and believe in you
to place you in the winning
column.

Team work is alright on the
athletic field but in parish politics
it won't do.

"There are now five candidates
for the position of postmaster of
Bogalusa. We were asked to
put in our application, but as
soon as we heard there was only
\$90 per month in the job we
respectfully declined. We want
to leave this small piece of pie
for some devoted Aswell ad-
mirer."—Bogalusa American.

Now, isn't that generous, how-
ever it sounds like "Sour grapes"
to us.

For the past twelve years we
have voted, in State and Congres-
sional primaries, with a majority
of the people of our parish and
in the coming State primary we
will again be found voting with
the majority of our people.

If we had no large city in this
State, where "Ring politics"
reigned supreme there would be
a landslide, in the coming election
in favor of Dr. Aswell, equalling
that of Vardaman of Mississippi.
