Charter of Bogalusa Mercantile Co. Ltd.

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA,
STATE OF LOUISIANA
PARISH OF WASHINGTON

Be it known, that on this the 20th day of February A. D. 1912, before me, BASCOM D. TALLEY, a Notary Public, duly commissioned sworn and qualified in and for Washington Parish Louisiana, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned,

Personally came and appeared the persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, all of legal age of Washington Parish Louisiana, who severally declared to me said Notary, that availing themselves of the laws of the state of Louisiana, relative to the organization and formation of Corporations, they have formed and organized and by these presents, do hereby form, organize and constitute themselves into a corporation, for the objects and purposes, and under the corporate name, stipulations and agreements hereinafter set forth, and which they do hereby adopt as their Charter of Incorporation, as follows:

ARTICLE 1.

The name of this corporation shall be the "BOGALUSA MERCANTILE CO. LTD." and it shall have its domicile in Bogalusa, Washington Parish, Louisiana, and shall have and enjoy succession under its corporate name for a period of Ninety-nine years from and after date hereof.

ARTICLE 2.

The Capital Stock of this corporation is hereby declared to be fixed at the sum of Twelve Thousand (\$12,000.00) Dollars divided into One Hundred Twenty (120) shares of One Hundred Dollars (\$100) each, which said shares shall be paid for in cash or its equivalent, at the time it is issued. This corporation shall begin operations and be a going concern as soon as Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) of its capital stock shall have been subscribed and issued.

ARTICLE 3.

The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized, are declared to be: To operate and conduct a general mercantile business; to buy and sell real estate, live stock and other personal property; to mortgage, pledge, sell property, both real and personal in any manner necessary for the successful carrying on the business, for which this corporation is organized; to buy and sell any and all commodities either at wholesale or retail; to operate and conduct branch establishments at such places in Bogalusa and vicinity as the Board of Directors of this corporation shall determine.

ARTICLE 4.

The officers of this corporation are hereby declared to be: President, Vice-President, Secretary and Manager. The duties of the President shall be the same ordinarily required of chairmen of associations. The Vice-President shall perform the duties of President in case of his absence or disability. The duties of the Secretary and Manager shall be fixed by the Board of Directors.

The Board of Directors for the ensuing year, are hereby named as follows: G. H. Wilcox, C. A. Wilcox and H. H. Wilcox; of which G. H. Wilcox shall serve as President, C. A. Wilcox as Vice-President and H. H. Wilcox as Secretary and Manager.

The business affairs of this corporation shall be managed by the above said Board of Directors, and their successors in office. The said officers and Directors shall hold their respective offices until the First Monday in March 1913 or until their successors shall have been duly elected and qualified.

The annual stockholders meeting shall be held at the office of the corporation on the First Monday in March of each year, and the directors, when elected at said meetings, shall take their seats immediately. The Board of Directors shall elect from their number the officers of the corporation to serve the ensuing year. The said Board of Directors shall have the power to make all rules and by-laws for the management of the business affairs of the corporation, or to alter or change the rules and by-laws by a two thirds vote at any regular meeting. The Board of Directors shall fix the time and place of its regular meetings, and the manner of calling special meetings. They shall have power to appoint all employees necessary for the management of the business and define their duties and fix the compensation therefor. All vacancies in the Board of Directors shall be filled by the remaining directors and any stockholder shall be eligible to serve as a Director.

ARTICLE 5

This corporation may be liquidated under the superintendence of two of its stockholders, to be appointed for that purpose by a general meeting of the stockholders, convened after fifteen days registered notice to each stockholder, and with the assent of two-thirds of the stockholders, in Amount of Stock Held, said liquidators or commissioners shall remain in office until the affairs of the said corporation shall have been fully liquidated and, in case of death of one of said liquidators the remaining member shall continue to act.

ARTICLE 6

This act of incorporation may be change or amended, or the corporation may be dissolved with the assent of two-thirds of the stock represented at any general meeting of the stockholders regularly called as provided for in case of liquidation.

No stockholders shall ever be held liable for the contracts or faults of this corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due on the shares of stock then owned by them, nor shall any informality in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null or of exposing a stockholder to any liability beyond the amount of his stock.

All stock in this corporation shall be issued under the directions of the board of directors, and the signers hereto, reserve the right to themselves to the balance of the Capital Stock of this corporation, in equal shares, and no stock shall be sold to and outsider without first giving sixty days written notice to each signer hereto and giving them the refusal thereof.

No stockholder herein, shall be allowed to sell or otherwise dispose of his stock until after first giving sixty days written notice to the other stockholders and the company herein organized, in order that they may have the refusal thereof, and the stockholders may purchase same at its book value.

All transfers of stock shall be made on the books of the corporation in the presence of the Secretary; and, the person to whom the stock is to be transferred must be acceptable to the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE 7

This Corporation shall have all the powers and rights of Corporations under the Laws of the State of Louisiana, shall have power to sue and be sued, and may have and use a corporate seal with such inscription or device as may be selected by the Board of Directors.

The President of this Corporation is hereby authorized to represent this Corporation in all suits at law, and any differences that may arise during its existence. He shall be governed, however, by resolution of the Board of Directors authorizing his actions. The President, and in his absence, the Vice President and in his absence, the Secretary and Manager are hereby declared to be the officer upon whom the service of legal papers is authorized to be made.

OLD COPY OF BACON'S ESSAYS.

Bacon's Essays, a copy of which realized £1,950 at the Huth sale, have a special title to fame. This work was the first of any importance to be translated from English into French. The translation proved a great success. In his preface to the third edition, Baudouin, the translator, complains that "at least four editions of this work would have been sold by now if the booksellers had not hampered its sale by their unwillingness to place it before the public." Still, the fact that three editions were called for within five years shows that the essays were heartily appreciated by French readers. The first French version of Shakespeare appeared in 1776—over 150 years after the translation of Bacon.—London Chronicle.
