School Board Minutes.

The Board of Directors of the Public Schools of Washington Parish met on the above date with each member present and the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved after being corrected so as show the following resolution of thanks to the retiring members of the Old Board. Whereas the retiring members of the Old School Board have been kindly enough interested in the welfare of the public schools of the parish to attend the regular January meeting without any cost to the Parish.

And, whereas the members of the New Board have profited by their presence and counsel.

Therefore, be it resolved that the New Board go on record as expressing to the retiring members of the Board their appreciation and thanks for their presence and counsel at this meeting.

On motion duly seconded and carried the secretary was requested to notify the presidents of the trustees in the Parish that he (president of trustees) is required to call a meeting of the patrons of his school on or before the fifteenth of March and at such meeting to elect three local trustees. Their names to be sent to the superintendent by the secretary of the meeting on or before the first of April 1913.

On motion duly seconded and carried the Superintendent was instructed to make out suitable blank report for use of trustees in making quarterly reports to the Parish Board, said report to be given in before each regular quarterly meeting in January, April, July and October. Also to prepare blank form of report to be made to the trustees of each school at the beginning of each fiscal school year, said statement to contain an estimate of funds for ensuing year and statement for past year.

On motion duly seconded and carried the president and secretary of the local trustees will be required to approve by signature all bills and teachers monthly reports before same are turned into this Board for payment.

The Board stood adjourned to meet Wednesday Feb. 5.

The president called the meeting to order promptly Wednesday morning as per adjournment with a full Board attendance.

On motion duly seconded and carried Mr. J. A. Moore was authorized to sell the old State Line School-House and place returns to the credit of said school.

On motion duly seconded and carried President F. B. Bateman and Superintendent D. H. Stringfield were appointed as a committee to take up with the Fiscal Agency for this Board the matter of adjusting interest on daily balances and arrange for necessary bond for ensuing year.

On motion duly seconded and carried each member of this Board will consult with trustees and patrons of their respective wards with the object of getting up a plan for dividing wards into school districts.

On motion seconded and carried the Board stood adjourned to meet April 4, 1913.

NAVIGATION NOTICE.
