



CHARTER.
State of Louisiana,
Parish of Washington,
On this 29th day of Sept. A. D. 1913 before me L. W. McDougall, notary public in and for the Parish of Washington, State of Louisiana personally appeared C. H. Bickham, C. J. Bickham and Martha Antoinette Bickham all three of this parish, who severally declared that they do hereby form and organize into a corporation for a term of 99 years from this date, under the name of C. H. Bickham & Son the domicile whereof is fixed in the Canebock Plate of Louisiana, and its objects and purposes and business being General Merchandising, the citation shall be served on the president, or in his absence, on the secretary.

The capital stock shall be \$5000 divided in to shares of \$100 each payable in cash or property.

The affairs shall be managed by a board of directors, composed of three stockholders, to be elected by the stockholders annually, by ballot, on the 2nd day of January, or any subsequent day fixed by the board in case of no election taking place on said day. Each share of stock shall be entitled to one vote. Said board shall have the right to make all by-laws and change and alter the same at pleasure.
