### Amendment to Charter.

Be it known and remembered that on this the 6th day of June, 1914, before me, Hiram E. Smith, Notary Public, duly commissioned and qualified in and for Washington Parish, Louisiana, personally came and appeared William E. Bickham, President of the corporation, Bickham & Son, Limited, and Benton E. Bickham, Secretary of said corporation, who declared to me in the presence of the hereinafter named and undersigned witnesses that in accordance with a resolution passed by the stockholders of the said corporation at a general meeting of the stockholders called for that purpose, held at the domicile of said corporation on Monday, May 25, 1914, due notice of which was published for more than 30 days prior to said date in the Era-Leader, a weekly newspaper published at Franklinton, Louisiana, and a written notice mailed to each stockholder of said corporation at his usual place of residence, more than forty days prior to the date of said meeting, which said resolution authorized the said William E. Bickham, President, and the said Benton E. Bickham, Secretary, to amend Article Number Two (2) and Article Number Four (4) of the charter of said corporation passed before Ansil N. Simmons, Notary Public, February 20th, 1903, of record in mortgage book 12, folio 476, of the mortgage records of Washington Parish, Louisiana, all stockholders being present and voting therefor, and in accordance with said resolution, and to carry the same into effect the said William E. Bickham and the said Benton E. Bickham, do hereby amend Article Number Two (2) of said charter to read as follows:

"The domicile of said corporation shall be at Hackley, Washington Parish, Louisiana, and all citations or legal proceedings shall be served on the President of the corporation, and in his absence or inability to act, on the Secretary of said corporation." And they do further amend Article Number Four (4) of said Charter to read as follows:

"The capital stock of said corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000) Dollars, to be divided into and represented by One Hundred and Fifty (150) shares of stock in the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars each; said stock shall be paid for at the time of subscription or the same may be issued at not less than par value in payment for property, real, personal or mixed, actually received or purchased by said corporation, and when the price thereof has been agreed upon by the Board of Directors, or such agents or officers as may have been designated for that purpose."

Thus done and signed at my Notarial Office at the Town of Franklinton, Washington Parish, Louisiana, on this the 6th day of June, 1914, in the presence of J. A. Crain and F. W. Brock, two competent witnesses.
