Fair Notes.

The past week has seen unusual upsets of plans on account of War-like disturbances in Europe but the directors of our local Fair Association have been very active in formulating plans by which it is expected that this, the fourth annual exhibition of farmers' products and utilities will exceed in variety, quantity and quality the former exhibitions.

For the information of those who failed to learn it we here state the names of the officers and heads of departments that have thus far accepted appointment: Dewitt Branch, president; J. O. Bethea, secretary; Frank R. McDougall, of 1st ward; Warren Wilkes, of 2nd ward; Frank Bateman, 3rd ward; J. M. Fusesel, of 4th ward; J. S. Knight, of 5th ward, directors proper. Then there are Mesdames P. B. Carter, J. Vol Brock and Delos R. Johnson constituting directorship of the Domestic Science Department. All these, with the publicity agent, will leave nothing undone that is required to make the Fair a pronounced success. They will, in other words "put a-r in Fair."

There have been selected four persons to superintend the several departments of present primary interest. These are Fred Bateman in charge of the Live Stock exhibits; Delos Magee of the Agricultural Products; C. Doremus, of Poultry; and Mrs. J. Vol Brock of the Ladies Department. Feed and shelter will be supplied at the expense of the Fair Association for the live stock and poultry. And a watchman will protect the exhibits at night.

The first day will be devoted to entering the exhibits and the third day will be set aside for rallying and horse racing. Each day should attract visitors; and those who come from afar may find ample accommodations for board and lodging among the local hostesses and residents.

A full description of the plans for the new building will be given our readers in another issue of the Era-Leader. Catalogues will go to press next week after which copies will be distributed gratis to all who may want them.
