The following resolution was  
 offered and unanimously adopted.

Whereas, the board of direc-  
 tors of the public schools of  
 Washington Parish La., is with-  
 out sufficient funds to carry on  
 the public schools of the Parish  
 for the balance of the year 1914,  
 for the reason that the taxes for  
 the current year have not been  
 collected, and it is therefore nec-  
 essary for said board to raise the  
 funds necessary for said school  
 expenses until the taxes assessed  
 for that purpose are collected.

Therefore, be it resolved by the  
 board of directors of the public  
 schools of Washington Parish,  
 La., that this board borrow from  
 the Washington Bank and Trust  
 Company, of Franklinton, La.,  
 the sum of \$20,000 or so much  
 thereof as may be necessary,  
 payable on or before January 15,  
 1915; and that this board do ex-  
 ecute and deliver to the said  
 Washington Bank and Trust  
 Company, of Franklinton, La.,  
 its certificate or certificates, of  
 indebtedness for said amount, or  
 so much thereof as may be nec-  
 essary, said certificates to bear  
 interest at the rate of five per  
 cent per annum from date, until  
 paid, and said loan to be paid out  
 of the funds to be collected for  
 the year 1914 as soon as same  
 are collected or from any other  
 sources of revenue received from  
 or by this board.

Be it further resolved that said  
 loan made be negotiated in in-  
 stalments and evidenced by one  
 or more certificates to be execut-  
 ed by the president and secretary  
 of this board in such amount and  
 at such times as the funds may  
 be needed; provided that the cer-  
 tificates issued herein shall not  
 exceed the sum of \$20,000 inclu-  
 sive of interest.

The board after discussing sev-  
 eral important matters which may  
 be acted upon at the next meet-  
 ing adjourned to meet Oct. 9th,  
 1914.

### Amendment to Charter.

STATE OF LOUISIANA,

Parish of Washington.

Be it known and remembered that  
 before me, Herman E. Gayer, a No-  
 tary Public in and for Washington  
 Parish, Louisiana, personally came  
 and appeared D. M. Simpson, Vice-  
 President, and B. L. Anderson, Sec-  
 retary of the Rex Lumber Company,  
 a corporation organized by notarial  
 act passed before Herman E. Gayer,  
 Notary Public, May 26, 1913, recorded  
 in Charter Book No. 1, folio 11, et  
 seq., of Washington Parish, La., and  
 the said Simpson and Anderson de-  
 clared unto me, said Notary Public,  
 in the presence of the hereinafter  
 named and undersigned witnesses,  
 that by virtue of a resolution of a  
 general meeting of the stockholders  
 of said corporation, adopted July 25,  
 1914, copy of which is annexed, they  
 were authorized to and do amend ar-  
 ticle No. 1 of the charter of said cor-

poration so as to read as follows:

"The name of this corporation shall  
 be D. M. Simpson Lumber Company,  
 and under that name it shall have and  
 enjoy succession and existence for a  
 period of 99 years, unless sooner dis-  
 solved in accordance with law or by  
 consent of the stockholders as hereinafter  
 provided. Under said name this  
 corporation shall have the power to  
 sue and to be sued, to contract, to  
 make and use a corporate seal and to  
 alter the same at pleasure; to hold,  
 receive, have, purchase, alienate,  
 pledge, mortgage, hypothecate under  
 said corporate name property real,  
 personal and mixed; to name and ap-  
 point such officers, directors, agents,  
 managers and other employees as the  
 interest or business of the corporation  
 may require, and to make and estab-  
 lish such rules, regulations and laws  
 for the purpose of proper management  
 of its affairs as it may deem necessary,  
 and said corporation shall hold and  
 exercise all such powers and privi-  
 leges as shall relate to the objects  
 herein set forth, or that may be neces-  
 sary to carry on the business for  
 which this corporation is established  
 and which this corporation may be  
 permitted to hold and exercise under  
 the laws of this state."

And the said appearers did in the  
 presence of the hereinafter named  
 and undersigned witnesses declare  
 that they do thus amend the said  
 charter.
