## Parish School Board Meets.

Franklinton, La., March 6.

On the above date the board of directors of the public schools of Washington Parish met in regular session with the following members present: D. Wallace, O. E. Morris, F. B. Bateman, L. T. Richardson, W. R. Seal, I. J. Green, J. A. Moore, M. C. Duncan and Willie Fussell.

The meeting was called to order by the president and the reading of the minutes of the January meeting was postponed. The first business to come before the board was the request from interested parties of each of the following named schools for a special school district: Crain's Creek, Pine, Ben's Ford, B. Smith, Bogue Loosa Creek and Knight's Branch.

On motion duly seconded and carried the following committees were appointed to outline the boundaries of each of these proposed districts. Crain's Creek—J. A. Moore, W. Branch, Hard Crain and A. Erwin; Pine, J. A. Moore, M. C. Duncan, W. R. Seal, W. P. Gerald, D. W. Crain and H. W. Thomas; Ben's Ford—L. T. Richardson and Mr. Adams; and B. Smith, Bogue Loosa Creek—I. J. Green, J. S. Knight, M. C. Crain and E. D. Sheridan.

On motion duly seconded and carried the report of the committee appointed to outline description of Crain's Creek district was received and Crain's Creek school district No. 38 was created and defined as follows to-wit: Beginning at the point where the Old Choctaw road intersects the state line between Louisiana and Mississippi, thence east along said line to the northeast corner of section 3-1-12, thence south to the southeast corner of section 22; thence west to southwest corner of section 21; thence south 1/2 mile; thence west to the Old Choctaw Road; thence north along said road to the state line, the point of beginning.

On motion duly seconded and carried the reports of the committees appointed to outline the boundaries of the Pine Ben's Ford and Bogue Loosa Creek School districts were received and notice is hereby given of the intention of the school board to

create and define the above named districts as described below: Pine—Beginning at the northwest corner of section 6-2-12; thence south to the southwest corner of section 6; thence east to the Choctaw Road; thence south along said road to the south boundary line of section 17; thence east to the southeast corner of section 15; thence north to the northeast corner of the southeast 1/4 of the northeast 1/4 of section 27-1-12, thence west one-half mile; thence north section line; thence west to the northeast corner of section 28; thence south 1/2; thence west to the old Choctaw Road; thence south along old Choctaw Road to point where same crosses township line between 1 and 2; thence west to the northwest corner of section 6-2-12, the point of beginning.

Bogue Loosa Creek—Beginning at the northeast corner of the John Measles hd. No. 39-2-12 thence south to the southeast corner of hd, thence east to the northeast corner of section 25; thence south to the southeast corner of section 18-3-12; thence west to hd. 40, thence north to the northeast corner of said hd; thence west to the east boundary line of David Mizell hd. 39; then north to the northeast cor. of said hd.; thence west to the southwest corner of the southeast 1/4 of section 11-3-11; thence north to the township line, thence east along said township line to the point where same crosses old Choctaw road, thence north along said road to the point where same crosses the north boundary of section 19-2-12; thence east to the northeast corner of the John Measles hd 39-2-12, to point of beginning.

Ben's Ford—Beginning at the northwest corner of the City of Bogalusa, thence north to the township line between 2 and 3; thence west to the northwest corner of section 6-3-13; thence south to the southwest corner of section 30, thence east to the southwest corner of section 29; thence south to the southwest corner of northwest 1/4 of section 32; thence east to center of section 32, thence north to section line; thence east to the southwest corner of the City of Bogalusa; thence north along the west line of the City of Bogalusa to the

## POLICE JURY PROCEEDINGS.

Franklinton, La., April 4, 1916.

The police jury met for the parish of Washington met on the above date in regular session at the court house in the town of Franklinton, with all members present except C. A. Jenkins.

The meeting was called to order by Pres. Smith at 9:00 o'clock a. m., and minutes of March 13th were read and approved, with the following correction: That J. E. Bateman give his services as janitor for the profit that he can make out of the waterworks above running expenses.

It was moved by R. H. Spring, duly seconded by M. K. Pearce that the matter of discontinuing the Seales road be deferred indefinitely. Carried.

A report was made by F. L. Sanford and J. W. Knight on grading the small piece of road near Julia station, and they recommended that a road be opened up from the river road south of Miller's creek, crossing the railroad at Alex Mizell's place connecting with the road now graded from Bogalusa at a point about one mile east of Julia station.

It was moved by M. K. Pearce, seconded by R. H. Spring, and carried that the report of the committee on the above road be received and adopted, and the same committee continued to have work done.

It was moved by F. L. Sanford, duly seconded by C. B. James and carried, the report of the committee on dipping vats were received and committee discharged.

A resolution was offered by F. L. Sanford, duly seconded by R. W. Bond that a committee of three members of the board together with five citizens, be authorized to furnish the cement and lumber necessary to build dipping vats and pens, not to exceed ten in number, and also to employ a man who understands how to mix cement. The location of vats to be made by this committee and be submitted to the members of the Police Juror of each ward. The citizens are to have the use of these vats free of charge, and are required to furnish the roofing, sand and all other materials, and do all work in putting in same. The committee is also to contract for the use of any vats where they can arrange with owners. Carried. Committee, F. L. Sanford, J. W. Knight, R. H. Spring, Dr. J. L. Brock, Leroy A. Pierce, J. W. Ford, T. J. Graves, W. T. Bullock.

It was moved by F. L. San-

ford, seconded M. K. Pearce and carried J. V. Rabb being present and upon receipt his report read, same was received and adopted.

It was moved by F. L. Sanford, duly seconded by M. K. Pearce, and carried, that a committee of two members of the board and two citizens to investigate as to the opening up a road from Rio to Sun, and make a report at the next meeting. Carried. Committee, F. L. Sanford, M. K. Pearce, W. H. Sullivan and Alfred Jenkins.

It was moved by F. L. Sanford and seconded by R. H. Spring, and carried that W. R. Bond was authorized to instruct Joe N. Magee road contractor to work old road known as Arcola and Franklinton road near A. Penny's place, the old route, and if any additional cost is asked to report same at the next meeting.

It was moved by F. L. Sanford, seconded by J. W. Knight, and carried July being the time to ask for bids for official printing, the same was deferred until that time, and all bids rejected.

It was moved by F. L. Sanford, seconded by J. W. Knight and carried that a bridge on Crow road be built, Oscar Crow to look after the building of same, cost not to exceed \$10.

On motion by M. K. Pearce seconded by F. L. Sanford, and carried the following parties were named and endorsed as board of directors of the Washington Parish Fair Association. W. H. Sullivan, J. B. Lindsley, M. N. Knight, D. E. Sheridan, Frank Batewan, J. W. Knight, I. J. Green, W. J. Alfred, R. H. Spring and D. E. Branch.

On motion by F. L. Sanford, seconded by M. K. Pearce and carried the bid of the Washington Bank and Trust Co., for the Fiscal Agent being the highest bid and the only bid, was accepted, for a period of two years.

On motion by F. L. Sanford, seconded by C. B. James, and carried, I. J. Green was employed to supervise bridge building of the parish for the balance of the year 1916.

On motion by R. H. Spring, duly seconded by J. W. Knight, and carried, Leslie Self being the lowest bidder for scraping and painting the steel bridges the contract was awarded to him, the work to be completed in 90 days.

On motion by F. L. Sanford, seconded by R. H. Spring and carried the secretary was ordered to draw a warrant for \$250 in favor of Ott and Johnson on the the 1915 fund to apply on Court House certificate.

On motion by F. L. Sanford seconded by J. W. Knight, and carried that the board borrow \$15,000 from the Washington Bank & Trust Co., and that a certificate of \$9,000 held by the Washington Bank & Trust Co., due May 8th, be taken up at once out of this loan.

On motion by F. L. Sanford, seconded by J. W. Knight, and carried the secretary was ordered to draw a warrant for \$210 on bridge fund to be placed to credit of feeding prisoners fund, and \$100 from incidental fund to credit of old account fund, \$200 from incidental fund to bridge fund.

There appearing no further business the board adjourned to meet May 2, 1916.
