### Town Council in Extra Session.

At a call meeting of the town council on Monday night the following matters were disposed of:

1st. Amendments to automobile speeding and lights as follows were passed. All autos in city limits must be run at a rate not exceeding 10 miles per hour. Every car within limits must have two lights in front, one on either side of engine and one red light in rear.

4th. Willis Magee, upon petition, was granted the right to build a side-track from the main line of the N. O. G. N. R. R., to his warehouse on Hancock Street.

5th. Wiley Pierce was elected town Marshal.
