Sunday And Gay-Shattuck Laws Will Be Enforced.

It had been rumored that very shortly there would be a strict enforcement of the liquor laws of the state in the parish of St. Tammany. Investigating as to the truth of this rumor, a representative of the St. Tammany Farmer called upon District Attorney Brock and asked him if the statement was true. Mr. Brock stated that the situation was such as compelled action on his part. There were frequent complaints of automobile parties coming into town from prohibition districts, and at times these cars were recklessly driven and the occupants noisy, making it unsafe and unpleasant for other cars on the road, especially when they were occupied by ladies. That he believed, if the laws were on the statute books they should be enforced, and as an officer of the law he could not make a distinction between saloons and other business. That it was his intention to write to each saloon-keeper and notify him of his intention to enforce the laws, so that this might be considered when license were taken out for the year coming.

It is stated that recently the Governor of Mississippi wrote to Governor Pleasant of Louisiana, complaining of the violation of the Sunday law in a town of St. Tammany parish, whereby large quantities of liquor found its way

into Mississippi towns. This letter was sent to Judge Carter by Gov. Pleasant and came to the notice of District Attorney Brock.

So it may be presumed that in 1917 there will be no more opening of saloons on Sunday, nor of any places of business prohibited under the law. Those who want to drink on Sundays will have to buy it some other day. Gambling or other violations of the law, we presume, will be just as vigorously prosecuted.

District Attorney Brock's position, as we understand it, is that he, as prosecuting attorney, is sworn to uphold the law, and that he will not shrink his duty in this respect.—St. Tammany Farmer.

Editor Era-Leader:

Herewith enclosed find clipping from the St. Tammany Farmer of last week which I hope you will publish. I believe every good citizen of Washington Parish will be glad to know that our District Attorney has determined to force the saloons of St. Tammany Parish to obey the law. Everybody knows that the local officials, whose duty it would seem should be to enforce the Sunday law, have heretofore winked at its violation. When local authorities refuse to act then the District Attorney is right in setting his foot down on the matter. It is an every Sunday occurrence for cars to pass through this neighborhood to Covington and return with some

of the party drunk. It should be stopped. I believe it will be stopped. Our judge is no less determined than our district attorney for I understand he is out spoken in his position and promises the saloon keeper a happy time when brought before him for violating the law. I believe the good people of St. Tammany Parish will approve this course, and God knows we will stand by our officers.

\$125,000 Fire In Wake Of Safe Robbery.

Columbia, Miss., Dec. 14.—Fire that started in a store building shortly after last midnight destroyed two large dry goods stores, a drug store and a hardware establishment in this city's principal business block, before it was gotten under control early today. The loss was estimated at more than \$125,000, about a third of which was covered by insurance.

The large Lampton department store and a bank adjoining escaped the flames. The authorities announced that the safe in the store where the fire originated had been robbed, and they believed the blaze was an incendiary origin.

The fire broke out in the rear end of Gross & Wilks' mercantile establishment, on Main street, and before it could be controlled the Berry Bros. Drug Company, Hill Hardware Co., J. Frank Brown Mercantile Company, Odum & Langston barber shop, the law office of Drs. J. C. Conner and D. A. Ratliff, which were in the Berry drug store were destroyed. The fire was discovered by Policeman Paterson.

The two volunteer hose companies did all that was possible to save the buildings and to confine the flames to the Gross & Wilks buildings and failing in that, to the Berry Bros. drug store building, but owing to the nature of the buildings and absence of sufficient fire fighting facilities, the flames made rapid progress.

The losses in part are as follows: The Lampton Company, two brick buildings occupied by J. Frank Brown and Hill Hardware Company, valued at \$15,000 insurance \$5500; Gross & Wilks, buildings and stock, \$40,000, insurance \$10,000; Hill Hardware Company, \$18,000, insurance \$12,000; Berry Bros., 16,000, insurance, \$6000; J. Frank Brown, \$5000, insurance, \$2000; Odum & Langston barber shop, \$1000, insurance, \$500; law office of Davis & Langston, \$1000, no insurance, offices of Drs. J. C. Conner and D. A. Ratliff, \$500 each, no insurance; Columbia Bank and law office of Mounger & Ford by water and removal, \$500, covered by insurance.
