Indignant Iowa Citizens Capture Town of Aspinwall.

Manilla, Iowa, Oct. 24.—Patriotic indignation at the refusal of the owner of the only assembly hall in Aspinwall, a village near here, to permit the use of his place by Liberty Loan campaigners, stirred more than seventy-five citizens of Manilla to such a resentment that they decended upon the little town today, closed its stores, obtained the arrest of the recalcitrant hall owner and obtained subscriptions for almost the entire quota of the township's bond allotment. The name of any citizen of the town, which is a German settlement, who did not buy a bond, was given to the federal authorities for investigation, and the State Council of Defense ordered the resignation of the town marshal. It had been told in Manilla that residents of Aspinwall were given to laughing scornfully when approached by Liberty bond salesmen, and though Manilla itself is populated largely by expatriated Germans, the mayor organized a flying squadron of bankers and business men, put them in fifteen automobiles and set out to see that Liberty Bond Day was celebrated in Aspinwall in a substantial way.

A deputy United States marshal was in the squadron and when John Brus, the owner of the town's hall, reiterated his refusal to open it for a Liberty Loan meeting he placed Brus under arrest. Mrs. Brus turned over the keys to the hall. The meeting was called and every able bodied resident was forced to attend. Not a business house remained open and subscriptions suddenly began to roll in.

ERECT NEW STRUCTURE.

Manufacturers and Merchants Demand Larger Exhibit Space.

Leading manufacturers and merchants of New Orleans, as well as a number of others having a national distribution for their goods, will be represented by comprehensive exhibits at the National Farm and Live Stock Show in that city, Nov. 10-19. At the initial show, in 1916, a large building provided for the purpose was found to be insufficient to meet the demands of such exhibitors, and this year another big structure has been erected.

The outlook is that every foot of space in the two buildings will be occupied during the 1917 fair by the displays of enterprising manufacturers and merchants, ready to greet their friends from the outlying districts. The Merchants and Manufacturers' Bureau of the New Orleans Association of Commerce has appointed a committee which will make a number of attractive awards for the best exhibits.

YOUTH TO COMPETE AT NATIONAL SHOW

Exhibits of boys' and girls' clubs will be one of the attractive features of the National Farm and Live Stock Show, in New Orleans, November 10-19. The Junior Extension and Home Economics department of the Louisiana State University will make a complete exhibit of the club work in Louisiana and challenges the world to competition. Mississippi has taken up the challenge and other states are expected to enter. E. S. Richardson of Baton Rouge is superintendent of the club exhibits department.

The boys and girls will make exhibits of pigs, corn, cotton, poultry, canned fruits and vegetables. A large attendance of boys and girls—members of various clubs in the South—is expected. Club members who wish to enter exhibits should write to the National Farm and Live Stock Show, New Orleans.

PROGRAM OF FAIR INCLUDES VARIETY OF BIG FEATURES

New Orleans To Have Events of Interest to Every State in the South.

One of the greatest tributes to the position attained by the National Farm and Live Stock Show, New Orleans, at a single bound and in less than a single year, was the granting of unusually low rates by all the railroads. It was recognition of the benefit of the enterprise to the farming and all other industries of the south, and of the wisdom of giving all the people of the south a chance to reach it and profit by it.

The war has placed an immense strain upon transportation facilities, and it is anticipated that there will be a shortage of cars and locomotives. For that reason the roads all over the country have largely reduced their concessions to the fairs. In some of the northern states there were no special rates put on, so that the attendance was seriously interfered with. The rates allowed the National are much better than last year, from the very cheap two days excursion privilege to the practically one-way fare for the round trip and "stay as long as you like."

The opportunity of taking in the big event with all its education and its chances to buy, sell and get acquainted, is too strong to resist. The farmers and the farm wife's and the farm youths' difficulty is going to be to decide as to the days on which to come, for each day has its own attraction and its own appeal. The best plan is to go for the entire fair. The ten days will be equivalent to a college course and a trip to half a dozen states and markets. If that is impossible, then the proper course is to get together and organize parties to enjoy some of the bright spots that tempt most. To facilitate such a survey the list of days is appended, although the mere titles do not begin to furnish all the details, nor is the list entirely complete even so short a time before the show. However, here it is:

Saturday, Nov. 10—Inaugural Day parade, Louisiana Travelers' Day, School and Children's Day.

Sunday—New Orleans Day, Fraternal Day, Floral Night parade. Monday—America and Allies' Day, Liberty Loan Day, Retail Merchants' Day.

Tuesday—Wholesale Merchants' and Manufacturers' Day, University and College Day, Land Day.

Wednesday—International live stock convention, John M. Parker, chairman; Louisiana and Mississippi Day.

Thursday—Farmers' and Planters' Day, Federal Land Bank Day, Agricultural Products Night parade, auction sale of Hereford and Holstein cattle, Duroc-Jersey swine and horses.

Friday—Pan-American Day, night horse show, auction sale of Angus and Jersey cattle, Poland China and Berkshire swine.

Saturday—Food Conservation Day, Boys' and Girls' Club Day, night horse show, Football Day, auction sale of Shorthorn and Red Poll cattle, Chester White and Hampshire swine, and various breeds of sheep.

Sunday—Concessionaires' Carnival Day, Trades and Labor Day, Press Day.

Monday—Negro Day.

The department of ethics and fair extension propaganda, under the direction of Mrs. M. R. Graham Bankston, has an individual and distinctive programme of days, each with a separate chairman and noted speakers. Patriotism, woman's progress, art, social service, ethnology, modern philosophy, economics, philanthropy and good times are the wide range of subjects that will appeal to thoughtful citizenship during nine days of public discussion and instruction.

The list of special days reveals the fact that the nights will be as attractive as the days. Friday and Saturday will be the night horse shows, among the most brilliant society functions given in New Orleans in years. There will be other features for various evenings, and the grounds will be as bright as day through the use of electric flood lighting, which is to receive its first test on such a big scale in this section.

A. B. Graves, superintendent of the agricultural department, originated and is organizing a series of night parades. The flower show will break out of bounds one night and stage marching gardens glow with light and beauty. There will be a similar night when agriculturists will be footed. Towards the end of the show the concessionaires and the white city dwellers will combine in a carnival. The live stock buyers' convention and sale will run through almost a week, and it will be international in scope, for half a dozen nations as well as a dozen states will be represented.

National Farm and Live Stock Show, to be held in New Orleans, Nov. 10-19, is the best place for the man who wants to buy good cattle or hogs to meet the man who has them to sell. Auction sales of pure-bred live stock will attract thousands to New Orleans during the big fair.

CHARTER.

Motor Sales & Service Co., Inc.

State of Louisiana, Parish of Washington.

Be it known, That on this 12th day of September, One Thousand, Nineteen Hundred and Seventeen, before me Delos R. Johnson, a Notary Public in and for Washington Parish, Louisiana, and in the presence of the undersigned witnesses, personally came and appeared the persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who severally declared that availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of the State of Louisiana, governing the organization of corporations, they do, by these presents, covenant and agree, and bind themselves, as well as such other persons as may become hereafter associated with them, for the purpose of forming and constituting a corporation or body politic in law, for the objects and purposes and under the stipulations following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.

The name and title of this Corporation shall be Motor Sales & Service Co., Inc., and it shall have and enjoy succession and existence for a period of ninety nine (99) years from the date hereof, with all powers, rights, privileges and immunities accorded to corporations under the law.

ARTICLE II.

The domicile of this corporation shall be in the town of Franklinton, State of Louisiana, where all citations and all legal processes shall be served upon the president, an in his absence upon the vice-president, and in the absence of the vice-president on the secretary thereof in the manner provided by law.

ARTICLE III.

The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized, and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are declared to be to engage in the operation of a general sales business of Motors and Motor Cars, Trucks, etc., and in the operation of a garage, and car repairing business, and all other matters incidental to such business.

ARTICLE IV.

The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of Five Thousand (\$5000) dollars divided into and represented by (50) shares at the par value of (\$100) each; no transfer of stock shall be binding upon this corporation unless the same appears upon its books. The stock holders may, in the manner provided by law, from time to time, increase the capital stock of this corporation to such an amount as they may see fit not to exceed \$25,000.

ARTICLE V.

The corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in a board of directors to be composed of not less than three persons to be selected by the stockholders at a general meeting to be held on the 1st Monday of January of each year, and each director shall be a stockholder of the corporation. Until the selection hereinabove provided, the following shall constitute the first board of directors, viz: Delos J. Magee, J. Fred Bateman and Magee W. Ott, all of whose address is Franklinton, Washington Parish Louisiana, with Delos J. Magee, president, Magee W. Ott, vice-president, and Fred J. Bateman, secretary-treasurer.

ARTICLE VI.

At the termination of this charter, or the dissolution of the corporation, its affairs shall be liquidated by three stockholders as liquidating commissioners to be selected by the board of directors.

ARTICLE VII.

The names of the stockholders, their address and the respective number of shares subscribed is hereunto attached and shown by the signatures of the parties hereto, and is hereby constituted the original subscription list.
