 - Miss Dovie Vickers, assistant Principal and teacher of English.
 - Miss Roberta Gale, latin and science.
 - Miss Susie Burnett, Charleston, Miss., history and science.
 - Miss Velma Magee, domestic science.
 - Miss Abbie Broyles, Snow Lake, Arkansas, 7th grade.
- The following teachers will have the other grades, though the exact assignments have not been definitely made: Mesdames C. N. Kimberlin, H. D. Bickham and Fred Fry, Misses Undine Whittle, Floyd Ball and Willie Richardson.
- Miss Mulligan, of Amite, music and expression.

In the new plan of the building, the present office of the principal will be used for the music room, the teacher to furnish her own piano, while the school piano will remain in the auditorium for the uninterrupted use of any department which may need it at various times.

Miss Mulligan comes with the highest endorsement as a performer as well as a teacher, having for personal reasons refused work on the lyceum platform, and it is certain that she will be able to work up both the music and expression departments of the school.
