T. J. Simmons Withdraws
From Sheriff's Race.

Much surprise was created Monday by the public announcement of the withdrawal of T. J. Simmons from the sheriff's race, interested comment, pro and con, filling the greater part of the day, disappointment and relief both being freely expressed.

Mr. Simmons has not at this time made a public statement of his reasons for withdrawing from the race, tho it is generally understood that being confined to his bed with flu at this critical period of the campaign was such a serious handicap as to require a greater effort to combat than Mr. Simmons' physical condition would permit.

This action makes J. E. Bateman the Democratic nominee for sheriff without the final run-off, and Tuesday's election narrows down to a vote between Mizell and Hood for Clerk of Court, with a contest in a few Wards for police juror. Not a very exciting day promised to be sure, but without doubt a relief to those most closely concerned.

HINTS ON BETTER
DAIRY FARMING

LOUISIANA FARMERS WHO VISITED WESTERN DAIRY CENTERS LEARN MANY THINGS.

SEE COOPERATION PAYS

Wisconsin and Illinois Farmers Work Hand in Hand With the Agricultural Colleges of Their States.

The number of purebred dairy bulls on Wisconsin farms has increased by 5,000 the last 12 months. The supply of such animals is the limiting factor.

There are 115 cow-testing associations in Wisconsin. Cows that do not measure up to standard are sent to the butcher.

Governor Hoard's motto: Be gentle with the dairy cow. Treat her with kindness and consideration. Treat her as a mother—for she is a mother.

Banks in Green County, Wisconsin, are liberal in making loans to help young men get started in the dairy business, and the banks have not lost a dollar of such loans.

Calves on the dairy farm must be given feed and care in order that they may develop into cows of the size and capacity desired.

There is need for more milk in every city and locality. The demand is rapidly increasing. It is absolutely essential that more attention be given to the development of the dairy industry.—G. C. Humphrey of the University of Wisconsin.

Milk production depends not only on the cow but also on the feed. Feed is the source of milk. The dairy cow is a machine for converting large quantities of feed and water into large quantities of milk.—Professor Humphrey.

A nondescript cow may occasionally be found that produces well, but a herd of such cows will have a low average as will their offspring. Get started in the dairy business with good individuals and good lines.—Professor Humphrey.

No cow is kept on the farm of Rabbler and Son of Green County, Wisconsin, that does not produce 48 pounds of milk at two years of age. Low-testing cows are also sold.

Dr. E. V. McCollum of Johns Hopkins University, a foremost authority on nutrition, who lectured at the National Dairy Show, says that there are no substitutes for milk and dairy products; they are essential to the growth of the child and to the health of the adult.

Dr. McCollum said further: "The people who have achieved, who have become large, strong, vigorous people, who have reduced their infant mortality, who have the best trades in the world, who have an appearance for art, literature and music, who are progressive in science and every activity of the human intellect are the people who have used liberal amounts of milk and its products."

According to Dr. McCollum, the last census on the size of children in New York showed that 19 per cent were undersized.

In an orphan's home a quart of milk a day was added to the diet of undersized children from two to four years old, and within five months a large percentage of them had reached normal size.

PROFIT SHARING HELPS
KEEP LABOR ON FARM


Farmers who employ labor on a profit-sharing basis have not suffered from a shortage of labor, according to J. Frank Harbert, farm help specialist for Louisiana, in the employ of the United States Department of Agriculture cooperating with the Extension Division, Louisiana State University. The plan of profit-sharing will solve the farm labor problem, says Mr. Harbert. Give the tenant an opportunity to raise hogs, chickens, etc., of his own and he will take a real interest in his work and in the farm. Then when he is offered five or six dollars a day for outside work he will refuse with the plea that he has interests of his own to look after.

The common method of profit-sharing in the South is for the landlord to furnish land, teams, farming implements and house for the tenant while the tenant furnishes the labor. The tenant then gets one-half of the crops produced.

Mr. Harbert advocates firmness, kindness and sympathy in dealing with farm help and giving them an opportunity to raise something for themselves.
