## Plant Sweet Potatoes For Food And Feed.

Sweet potatoes may be planted until well into July and may be depended upon to make a fair yield even under adverse conditions, according to M. Hull of the Extension Division, Louisiana State University. Land from which Irish potatoes, beans and strawberries have been harvested is ideally adapted for sweet potatoes. Very little is necessary to put such land into condition for sweet potatoes and little, if any, fertilizer is needed.

The sweet potato, as almost everyone knows, is an excellent food for livestock as well as for the human family. No farmer need fear that he will produce too many sweet potatoes, says Mr. Hull, provided he is equipped with a modern storage house in which to cure his crop.

## Lightning Destroys Barn, Burns Calf.

During the heavy rain and thunder storm last week which did considerable damage to crops, fences and buildings in this section, lightning struck the new barn just erected by Charlie Jenkins. The building was quickly destroyed by fire, a fine calf in the barn being also burned up while Mr. Jenkins was barely able to save his horse from the burning building.

## Navy Summer School.

Word has been received that the Navy will open a Summer School for boys between the age of 16 and 20 at Great Lakes, Ill. The course will be for six weeks and will begin on July 15, 1920. Applicants must pass the required physical examination. Passage to Great Lakes will be paid by the applicant. Passage back home will be paid by the Government. While at school the boys will be paid \$33.00 per month. Application for entrance in this school should be made to the U. S. Navy Recruiting Officer, 730 Common Street, New Orleans, La. Instructions will consist of physical development, discipline, education of character and cultivation of Naval traditions. Religious instructions and recreation will not be neglected. The quota for the Louisiana district is 23 men.

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## General News In Brief.

Governor Parker announced he believed the Legislature will adopt his program and there will be no special session.

Bonar Law, in the House of Commons, declared that England is willing to accept President Wilson's definition of the Armenian boundaries.

Anti-Vardaman men were in control of the Mississippi Democratic state convention.

By a decision of the Illinois Supreme Court, Mayor William Hale Thompson and his ring were ousted from power and the Deeneen forces returned.

More details were given of the German plot to incite Mohammedans to join the Bolsheviks and Turks against British.

President Gompers, defeated by radicals in government ownership fight, announced he was not sure he would seek re-election as A. F. of L. head.

The treasury of Mexico was found to be 1,800,000 pesos short, from Carranza's unsecured loans.

Governor Parker sent a message to the Louisiana Legislature recommending reorganization of the New Orleans city government.

Philix J. Birbiglia was refused a change of venue, and ordered to stand trial Wednesday for Mrs. Neason's death.

The contractors of New Orleans decided to make an attempt to resume building operations under the open shop.

With the elimination of W. G. McAdoo as a candidate, Cox Democrats were certain of victory in San Francisco.

Opinion at Baton Rouge was that suffrage, either of the state or federal variety will not be passed by the Legislature.

General LeJeune, a native Louisianian, was promoted to head the U. S. Marines because of his splendid world war record.

The general appropriations bill carrying \$11,000,000 was introduced in the House Tuesday.

The advance delegates for the Democratic National Convention displayed enthusiasm for Mrs. Annette A. Adams for the vice presidential nominee.

Samuel Gompers was re-elected for the thirty-ninth time president of the American Federation of Labor.

Former Secretary of the Treasury William G. McAdoo announced that he could not permit his name to go before the Democratic convention.

President Wilson signed the water power bill but failed to approve the wood pulp and repeal of war time measures.

Detroit's population has doubled in the last ten years, now having 993,739 inhabitants, the Census Bureau announced.

Geo. W. Perkins, famous banker and insurance man and executive manager of the Roosevelt campaign, died after a brief illness at Stamford, Conn.

Three heavy blows were dealt to the G. O. P. hopes of a fall victory in the third party, Johnson and league developments.

The Allied premiers in session at Boulogne fixed the amount of the German reparations at three billion marks in gold.

Both houses of the Louisiana General Assembly faced a heavy calendar with the prospect of triple sessions.
