

**Police Jury Proceedings.**

Franklinton, La., Aug. 6, 1920.  
The Police Jury in and for the Parish of Washington, State of Louisiana met in regular session at the Court House on the above date with all members present.

The meeting was called to order by the President J. R. Leslie and the minutes of July 2nd was read and stood approved.

On motion by G. M. Tate seconded by J. A. Fendlason the committee to sell old gasoline engine on the Court House square was continued to confer with the town committee in reference to sale of same. Carried.

On motion by G. M. Tate duly seconded by R. H. Spring the following resolution was offered and unanimously adopted.

Be It Resolved, That in order to facilitate the construction of good roads and highways of the Parish of Washington, and to avoid delays in securing right of way for said roads, that J. Vol Brock District Attorney of the 26th Judicial District of Louisiana, be and is hereby authorized and requested to immediately file and prosecute any and all expropriation suits that may be necessary in order to secure the right of way for the road contractors thruout the Parish; said suits to be filed upon information to be received from the contractors or from any other reliable source at the discretion of the said District Attorney.

At 11:00 o'clock A. M. the time for opening bid for the contract of the hard surface road to Richardson, Louisiana, and three miles of the wire road towards Covington. There being two bids received and the road committee, together with the Parish Highway Engineer, went in session and upon examination of the two bids B. H. Bass & Co., being the lowest bidder it was decided to accept the bid, B. H. Bass & Co., and upon recommendation of the committee to the Police Jury the same was accepted. Carried.

Jenkins duly seconded by Louis Crain, that a road be granted from just above the Oak Farm on the Brassfield Road leading north by S. L. Jenkins place to enter the Bouy Smith road one-half mile above Knight's Branch the people are to open the road and build the bridge across Bogalusa Creek. The Parish to pay for the Lumber only.

On motion by R. H. Spring seconded by Louis Crain that the Constable of the 3rd Ward be allowed \$15.00 per month salary. Carried.

On motion by S. S. Thomas seconded by Louis Crain that Mr. Spring be allowed to build the Daniel, Sharp and Gum Swamp bridges. Carried.

On motion by R. H. Spring seconded by W. O. Seal that S. S. Thomas build two bridges on the rural route on the Hackley and Clifton road. Carried. There appearing no further business the Board stood adjourned to meet Friday September 3, 1920.

The meeting was called to order by the President J. R. Leslie at 11:00 o'clock A. M. and he announced the purpose of the meeting was to discuss the methods of securing right of way for the State Highway from Franklinton to the Mississippi State line Section C.

On motion by J. H. Cassidy duly seconded by G. M. Tate, the President appointed a committee of twelve men to investigate and

assess the damages for right of way for the State Highway.

Committee composed of the following: C. B. Jones, W. J. Alford, J. T. Magee, W. J. Crain, F. R. Miller, W. P. Bullock, Geo. Seal, C. R. Pope, Hard Thomas, Wilber Branch, J. W. Carter, L. P. Pierce.

**General News In Brief.**

Charles Marshall, convicted murderer of William Miller, an infant, was hanged at Tupelo, Miss.

Regretting that Senator Harding and he will not meet at Ohio State Fair, Governor Cox declared he would welcome a debate.

Judge Skinner in his opinion on the city probe case declined to dissolve the injunction granted to the ring.

Letters from Poland showed that women of the nation fought shoulder to shoulder with the men and helped gain a great victory.

Marshal Foch was honored by the gift of a jeweled baton by the K. of C., at the dedication of Lafayette's statue in Metz.

The first wireless literally "heard round the world" reached Washington from the new Lafayette radio station at Bordeaux, France, Saturday.

The New York Evening Post came out for Cox for president because of Harding's silence on the League of Nations covenant.

It was announced the newly formed Cotton Growers' Association of Oklahoma would market the 1921 cotton crop of that state.

Dr. and Mrs. Nicholas Kopeloff bacteriologists, have discovered a way to kill sugar bacteria, which attack it sweetness.

Polish forces, under the personal direction of President Pilsudski, drove the Reds back, taking many prisoners and munitions.

Major General H. L. Rogers said the War Department has no thought of abandoning the great army warehouses in New Orleans.

It was announced the American Red-Cross would conduct its fourth annual roll call from Armistice Day to Thanksgiving.

Plans were made for a celebration in many cities of the centennial of the birth of Jennie Lind, "Swedish Nightingale, October 6,

A plan to retire 25 per cent of growing cotton crop was outlined by the president of the American Cotton Association.

Negotiations for the merger of International Petroleum Co. Ltd., and the Tropical Oil Company were concluded, the deal involving \$100,000,000.

The Southern Pine Association placed the average car shortage for mills of the South at 50 per cent.

Prices of necessities were reported generally lower on the whole in New Orleans than they were six months ago.

Charles Pozzi, "financial wizard," declared his assets to be \$4,000,000, while official reports set his liabilities at close to \$7,000,000.
