Proclamation.

Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Washington Parish School Board of Washington Parish, Louisiana, at a meeting held on the 20th day of August 1920, I, F. B. Bateman, President of said Parish School Board, do hereby give notice that, in compliance with said resolution, a special election will be held in Varnado School District No. 3, Parish of Washington, Louisiana, on the 30th day of September, 1920, for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers qualified under the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana to vote at said election, the following proposition, to wit:

To levy a special tax of 10 mills on the dollar on all the property in Varnado School District No. 3, Parish of Washington, Louisiana, subject to State taxation, annually for a period of five years, for the purpose of constructing school buildings at Varna-

do and Adams Creek and purchasing equipment for the Military Road School.

For the purpose of said special election the polling place will be at Dr. Stewart's old office, and the following commissioners and clerk of election have been appointed to serve at this election, all of whom will serve without compensation: Jeff Ard, G. C. Blake, R. H. Magee, C. E. Forreberry, Clerk.

At said special election the polls will open at seven o'clock a. m., and close at five o'clock p. m., and the election will be conducted in accordance with the laws of Louisiana applicable thereto.

Notice is also given that at 10 o'clock A. M. of the 1st day of October, 1920, the said Parish School Board of the Parish of Washington, Louisiana, will meet at Franklinton, Louisiana, and in open session proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns and declare the result of said special election.


