Ordinance.

To amend and re-enact and re-ordain first paragraph of ordinance adopted at meeting held May 12th, 1920, being an ordinance "authorizing the issuance of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) dollars of Bonds of the Bogalusa School District, prescribing the form thereof, and providing for the levy of taxes for the payment of the principal and interest on said bonds."

Whereas it appears that the interest is fixed in the original ordinance as having been made payable on February 15th and July 15th, of each year, when it should be on January 15th and July 15th of each year.

Therefore Be It Ordained by the Washington Parish School Board, that the first Paragraph of Ordinance No. . . . adopted by the Washington Parish School Board, May 12th, 1920, being an ordinance "authorizing the issuance of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) dollars of Bonds of the Bogalusa School District, prescribing the form thereof, and providing for the levy of taxes for the payment of the principal and interest on said bonds, be and the said ordinance is hereby amended and re-ordained to read as follows:

"Therefore be it ordained by the Washington Parish School Board in compliance with the terms of Article 281 of the constitution of the State of Louisiana and Act 256 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana for the year 1910 as amended, and acting as the governing authority of the Bogalusa School District and the said Washington Parish School Board having been authorized at an election held in the Bogalusa School District on the 11th day of May, 1920, hereby authorizes the incurring of an indebtedness of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars by said Bogalusa School District for the purpose of purchasing, constructing and equipping school buildings within the Bogalusa School District, and to represent said indebtedness, the said Washington Parish School Board does hereby authorize the issuance of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars of bonds of said School District, numbered from one to one hundred inclusive, of the denominations of One Thousand (\$1000.00) dollars each, dated July 15, 1920, bearing interest at the rate of five per centum, per annum from date until paid, said interest being payable semi-annually on the 15 days of January and July in each year, and each of said Bonds having attached thereto, semi-annual coupons, to represent the said interest."

The ordinance having been submitted to a vote, the vote thereon, was as follows:

Yeas: A. D. Wallace, O. E. Morris, F. B. Bateman, J. K. Johnson, L. T. Richardson, Geo. C. Knight, G. W. Knight, J. A. Moore, Willis Fussell J. H. Mitchell.

Nays: None.

And the ordinance was declared adopted.
