President Harding is holding down the world's biggest job at a low cost to American taxpayers. This year the total expenses of the chief executive's branch of the government will be considerably less than a quarter of a million dollars. King George cost the British Empire \$2,500,000 a year and he has had to economize to make ends meet. President Harding receives \$100,000 for salary as traveling expenses; his office expenses will amount to \$80,000 and a fund for contingencies to \$36,000—a total of \$216,000.
