Colonel Boatner for Associate Justice.

It is seldom that a more universal support is given to any man than that which is so heartily accorded Col. C. J. Boatner for the position on the supreme bench left vacant by the death of late lamented Justice Miller.

He is in the prime of life; a man of intense mental and physical vigor; of keen incisive intellect, and of ripe learning in the science of the law.

It goes without saying, of course, that his personal character is above reproach. In this connection we notice the usual opposition from certain sources to what is termed a politician for the supreme bench.

Some people who take this position are sincere, though, we believe, mistaken; but a large majority of them are the veriest hypocrites in a government.

As a citizen, whether he be the cross-road wretch in the rural districts, or the statesman who maps out and sets in motion the policies of government, is a politician.

This is necessarily so because our government instead of being by the people, of the people, and for the people, as the visionaries believe, is in truth, a government by political parties.

In all ages and in all civilized countries, the lawyer has played an important part in governmental affairs, because his training and habits of thought specially fit him for such work.

Col. Boatner, by reason of his commanding ability, has since his early manhood, been a leader among the strongest public men in the State, and his acts to the service of his party, is in his favor instead of being against him.

Neither common justice nor public policy will sanction the idea that such a man as Col. Boatner should be called upon in times of danger to his party and State, but ignored when it comes to dispensing the honors that ought to fall to such men.

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What the Papers in the Judicial District Have to Say About the New District Attorney.

Mr. C. V. Porter, of Natchitoches, was appointed District Attorney of this the Tenth Judicial District by Governor Foster, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Mr. Phanor Breazeale.

Pursuant to resignation of Hon. Phanor Breazeale as District Attorney of the Tenth Judicial District, composed of the parishes of Rapides, Natchitoches and Avoyelles, to qualify under his recent election as a member of Congress, Governor Foster has appointed Mr. C. V. Porter, of Natchitoches, to fill the vacancy.

Governor Foster on the fourth of March, filled the vacancy in the District Attorney's office, made so by the election of the incumbent, Hon. Phanor Breazeale, to the Congress of the United States, by the appointment of Mr. C. V. Porter, of the Parish of Natchitoches.

Hon. C. V. Porter of Natchitoches has been commissioned by the Governor as district attorney for the Natchitoches Rapides-Avoyelles district to succeed Hon. Phanor Breazeale, who was recently elected to Congress from the Fourth Congressional District.

There being two Judges in that district and Rapides and Avoyelles having them it was considered that the district attorneyship should go to Natchitoches, and in the whole State for the matter of their infraction of the law will meet with vigorous prosecutions.

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The Management of the Louisiana Industrial Exposition receives daily assurances that success will crown their efforts.

At a special meeting held last Monday night his Excellency Governor Foster and Mayor W. C. Flower were in attendance by special invitation. Governor Foster made a detailed verbal statement as to the reception which had been accorded the special committee sent to Washington to invite the attendance of President McKinley at the Peace Jubilee and said that the interview with Mr. McKinley was such as to assure his presence in New Orleans on May 8th when the Exposition will be opened.

State senator J. F. Denechaud, chairman of the committee on Transportation has been actively engaged in working up the interest of the railroad men and has succeeded in having approval recommended for the establishment of such a rate as will bring thousands of people into New Orleans during the Fair. This plan is that the railroad companies are to issue tickets good for seven days within a radius of 350 miles of New Orleans and that the rate of one fare for the round trip is to be established on all roads. It is all but officially understood that the plan will be acceptable and so announced by the railroads.

The fact that Mr. Sulzer is being pushed by New York friends for the leadership of the Democratic party in Congress causes the Boston Herald to remark as follows:

The Democrats of the House are not strong in this respect; indeed, for some time they have been singularly inferior to the Republicans in point of talent, and they have lost two or three of their most valuable men through their voluntary retirement from Congress at the close of the present session. We find more talent, it is not more of the qualities of leadership, in the next Congress to be DeArmond of Missouri, Richardson of Tennessee or Williams of Mississippi than in the New York member."

It is thought that Win. J. Bryan will be in Shreveport for the Carnival that was postponed from Mardi Gras until the 3rd and 4th of April. There will be any number of attractions in the way of parades, speeches, fireworks, balls, etc., and no doubt the large delegation from Natchitoches that is expected to attend in Feb. will go up for this occasion, augmented by many more.

Very sensational was the arrest the other day of Doctors Souchon and Kohne, of New Orleans, two of the most prominent physicians in the State on the charge of manslaughter, resulting from the alleged suppression of yellow fever news, on indictments issued from East Feliciana. They were taken to Clinton, the parish seat by a deputy sheriff for the preliminary examination and both were released on \$1,000 bond and the trial was fixed for September.

A Natchitoches Parish Boy Honored.

Among the hundred bright young men to enter the list and stand an examination for the extern student's staff of the Charity Hospital Ambulance corps eleven only were successful and out of that number one is a Natchitoches boy, Mr. Burdett A. Terrett, whose mother Mrs. C. Crain is now a resident of our city.

The Playmate says: Among the successful candidates for resident students of the charity hospital, the names of 108 of the present students of the Toussaint appear—Messrs. S. M. D. Clark and B. A. Terrett. These young gentlemen began their professional studies at Tulane University in 1895. In the spring of 1897 they were among the three successful candidates to enter the Toussaint, in a contest in which there were some forty-odd competitors. Under the able guidance of Dr. F. Loeber, the eminent physician and house surgeon of this institution, they have completed a two-year course of hospital work, and have been awarded gold medals for meritorious service. In the recent competitive examination for the charity hospital, in which some hundred or more aspirants contested, they have distinguished themselves by the commendations themselves to the examining board by the excellence of their papers and the profound knowledge they displayed of the science of their chosen profession.

Burdett A. Terrett was born in Natchitoches in 1878. He received his early education in the public schools of his parish. At an early age he embarked in mercantile pursuits. In 1895 he began the study of medicine in the medical department of Tulane University, and by hard work and close application, has succeeded in reaching the goal to which every medical student aspires. Mr. Terrett comes from a family of soldiers. His grandfather was a captain in the United States army and on the field of West Point, and on the battlefields of hostilities between the states he left the army and cast his lot with the Confederate States, and served throughout the war.

Dr. Mac Known, whose sensational charges against Doctors Souchon and Kohne, published in the Baton Rouge Advocate some time ago, has been expelled from the New Orleans Medical Society, and quite a breeze of time was had at the last meeting of that august body, when he refused to apologize.


