WOMEN WILL DRIVE IN TAN BARK ARENA

Mrs. Louisa Long and Others Are Coming

TO HORSE SHOW MARCH 10

Night Attraction Opens on Monday in Glare of Light—New Features For Each Performance Scheduled by Management.

Classification and prize lists are out announcing the Fort Worth Horse Show, which opens the night of March 10, and closes March 15. The show will be held in connection with the Fat Stock Show, as usual, but will not open on the same date with the Fat Stock exhibit.

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Mrs. Louisa Long of Kansas City has one of the most famous strings of blooded horses in the world. To her lot has fallen some of the handsomest and ever awarded an exhibitor in the tan bark ring. Her winnings at the London City, St. Louis and Madison Square Garden have placed her in the front rank of American horsewomen. King, a brown trotting stallion, has perhaps won more individual scores than any other horse living. With this horse Miss Long captured everything in London, New York and other places.

She has also been a strong winner at Fort Worth. The famous horse was purchased by Miss Long in the Fort Worth ring during the 1910 Horse Show.

Last year Miss Long came to the Fort Worth Show with an increased string. She had added to her coach and Hackney and a springing time presented a young saddle that has since won wherever shown.

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Besides these two women, Fort Worth women will be seen driving in the ring. There has been a sprinkling of women drivers for years, but the 1913 show will present the greatest array of all.

The best stable in the South will show in the ring at the coliseum, and this year will present the largest number of Texas horses since the beginning of the show. Exhibitors are crowded in the last few years and only last year some of the breeders who have been constant exhibitors at the show, their stables to a considerable extent.

Blue-blooded horses from Kentucky and the best stock in every section of the South will compete. Many Fort Worth horsemen are now training their youngsters for the exhibition, and nearly every Sunday the Fort Worth Driving Club's grounds are crowded with drivers of every description. One Fort Worth man, who has never before exhibited in the show ring, is now grooming a stable of six youngsters, which he expects to be in shape to bring about stiff competition in their classes.

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FAT STOCK SHOW OPENS MARCH 8

Big Premium List is Now in Readiness.

SEVEN DAYS OF PLEASURE

Committee Chosen From Breeding Associations Make Rules Governing All Contests—Beef and Dairy Breeds to Exhibit.

When the National Feeders and Breeders' Show at Fort Worth, Tex., swings open its doors Saturday morning, March 8, the greatest cattle show ever presented to the American people under Southern skies will begin a history making exhibition.

Cattle fattened on the ranges of West Texas and Oklahoma, those from the pasture lands of the East, and, last but not least, from across the border in Old Mexico, will pass under the eye of the most skilled judges known to the different breeding associations for honors which mean everything to their owners. The cattle classification this year includes every known breed of consequence and suitable prizes go with each division.

All the cattle entering for competition will come under the rules of the "Sifting Committee." This committee is composed of members to be recommended by the various breeding associations and will pass upon the ages and eligibility of all the entries. It is such that such entries are within the limit. The age limit on both breeding and fat cattle will be rigidly enforced. J. F. Yearwood of Georgetown, W. C. McKamy of Renner, Garrett King of Taylor, H. B. Johnson of Chickasha and J. W. Cook of Beville have been chosen to act upon the Sifting Committee.

A code of rules have been drafted and adopted by the committee and a copy mailed to the different exhibitors so that they can familiarize themselves. The rules will be followed to the letter in every detail, and all exhibitors will be forced to observe them.

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Thirty-six Months—Three pairs of broad teeth should be fully up and in wear, and the corner milk teeth will be shed or shedding, with the corner permanent teeth just appearing through the gums.

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Baby Beef Clubs.

An addition to the Cattle Division is the Baby Beef exhibits which have been given a place. This class of beef is grown by the boys on the farm and is then given a 100 lb. credit and the prize money. In less than a year Baby Beef Clubs have sprung up all over the Southwest, and the rivalry between the individual boys and the clubs promises to be keen. Boys from Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana and New Mexico have all vied in their entries and this year the promise is to be one of the principle drawing cards in the Cattle Division. Places in both sections above and below the quarantine line have been provided for the proper housing of exhibits.

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Manufacturers of the Southwest will hold a show in connection with the National Feeders and Breeders' Show at Fort Worth on March 8 to 15, inclusive. Special space has been granted the manufacturers for their exhibits.

The National Feeders and Breeders' Show will attract thousands from all over the Southwest.
