## Medical Inspection.

By the Department of Education

March 14, 1913. To Members of Parish School Boards, Principal of Schools and Parish Superintendents: Gentlemen:

I respectfully call your attention to the following in the interest of medical inspection in Louisiana public schools:

HOMER HIGH SCHOOL, CLAIBORNE PARISH.

Principal O. B. Staples secured the co-operation of the physicians and dentists of Homer and had all the children of the high school examined, for (1) defective teeth, (2) defective vision, (3) defective hearing, and (4) nasal troubles. (Explanation of fractions: Assuming that a Normal Eye could read print of a certain size at a distance of twenty feet; 74, 10-20 would mean that 74 children had to be placed within ten feet of the same print to be able to read it).

961 children out of every 100 has defective eyes.

42 children out of every 100 could not hear perfectly.

25 children out of every 100 were the victims of nose troubles.

32 children out of every 100 had adenoids or other throat troubles.

Stated differently: If the 285 children attending the Homer high school are representative of the school population of the State, the following are facts concerning our school children:

480,000 do not see as well as they should.

210,000 have defective hearing.

125,000 are afflicted with nose troubles.

160,000 have diseased throats.

3,500,000 decayed
