CHARTER. STATE OF LOUISIANA, PARISH OF NATCHITOCHEES. ART I. On this 29th day of March 1915, came and appeared before me Geo. E. Prothro, a Notary Public, in and for the Parish and State above written, the persons whose names are hereto subscribed, all adult residents of the State of Louisiana, who declare, that they do hereby organize under the laws of this State, a corporation to exist for ninety-nine years from date, and to be known as the WILDCAT OIL COMPANY, INC., domiciled in the Village of Campti, Parish of Natchitoches, State of Louisiana, with capital stock of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00), in Five thousand shares of (\$10.00) each, payable in cash or property.

ART II. Said corporation is authorized to contract, sue and be sued; to make and use a common seal, and a letter same at pleasure; to acquire property by grant, gift, purchase and to devise or bequest; to lease, hold and dispose of, and to mortgage and pledge the same; to appoint such officers and Agents and employees as the business of the corporation may require; to fix their compensation; to make through its Board of Directors all needful by laws for the government and management of the corporation.

ART III. The objects and purposes of this corporation are hereby declared to be the exploitation by drilling or otherwise, for oil gas or other minerals, including the construction of pipe lines, tanks and all other acts and things incidental to, or connected with said business in all its branches.
